From Pastor Daniel

On July 22, twelve youth and three adults (Trish Coffey, Joe Adkins and myself) will be departing for our trip to visit with our German partners in Klein Schwechten. It has been two years since we have seen each other and we are all excited to be together again.

Our group is flying on Iceland Air which offers a stop-over in Iceland. We will be arriving on Friday the 23rd at 6:30 am and boarding a bus for the Golden Circle Tour, highlighting some of the best sites in beautiful Iceland. This is the same tour our ERUCC Scandinavian cruise group embarked on several years ago.

We will spend the night at a youth hostel type hotel and then leave early the next morning to fly to Berlin. Our friends will greet us at the airport and the rest of the day will be spent with our host families.

Sunday morning, I will be leading worship with Pastor Alex and youth from both groups will be reading scripture and reflecting on their dreams for peace.

Monday we leave for Ravensbruck. Some of you have read recently published historical novels such as Lilac Girls and Lost Roses which depict the lives of women resisters and spies during WWII who were imprisoned at Ravensbruck. We will be staying at a youth hostel there that has been transformed into an international youth meeting place. Here's some information from the website:

Our youth hostel has been a place of questioning, learning and understanding for many years. In the immediate vicinity of the former women's concentration camp, in the houses of the guards of the former concentration camp, in order to create the opportunity for school trips conferences and international youth encounters right next to today's memorial.

Located in the middle of several nature parks and countless chains of lakes, our Ravensbrück Youth Hostel is an ideal starting point for bike tours, canoe tours and hikes.

Sustainability seals of approval guarantee quality standards with the aim of conserving and saving resources, choosing environmentally friendly products where possible and offering educational offers with a social and environmentally-oriented focus.

As we gather with our German partners and learn more about this aspect of German history, we will be engaged in mutual conversations about climate change and the environment, the dynamics occurring in both our countries of white supremacy, anti-racism, and the dangers of rejecting freedoms such as freedom of the press.

So we will worship, learn, and engage in conversation but we will also have time to play. After a year of looking at screens for school, I believe both the German and the American youth are more than ready to run around, play games, and enjoy being in the nature.

On the way back to Klein Schwechen and our last evening with our host families, we will make a stop to visit the city Potsdam.

Thank you, ERUCC and friends, for your support of youth ministry. These opportunities nurture the faith of our youth and the adults who participate in this partnership as well as provide a foundation for understanding what it means to be global citizens.

AUGUST WORSHIP NOTES

(Worship from Season of the Spirit and Pulpit Resource)

August 1

The writer of Ephesians in 4: 1-16 tells the people to forbear one another in love in order that the Body of Christ, the church, might be edified. In a reminder of the importance of nourishing the spirit with food that draws eternal life, Jesus calls himself the bread of life in John 6:24-35, bread that sustains the Body of Christ.

We will be sharing communion this morning.

August 8

Psalm 34: 1-8 is a song of praise. Jesus reminds his disciples that he is the bread of life in John 6:35, 41-51, and models the true life lived in God.

August 15

In today's passage from Ephesians 5: 15-20, the people of the early church are encouraged to live with wisdom, to use their time well, and to reject foolishness. People listening to Jesus struggle to discern his message in John 6:51-58. Just as God provides wisdom to Solomon, Jesus provides spiritual nourishment to the people. Together, these passages affirm the centrality of God's gift of wisdom in the life of faith.

Today we will be celebrating our annual Blessing of the Backpacks as we pray for another school year and ask God's blessing upon students, parents, teachers, and administrators. Students are invited to bring their backpacks and teachers ad administrator their book bags.

August 22

The first reading from Ephesians 6: 10-20 is a reflection on the spiritual forces that get in the way of our living as God calls us to live, as well as a description of the ways in which God prepares and protects us for the challenges of the life of faith. This week's focus passage calls believers to prayer and perseverance, even amid trying times.

In John 6:56-69, Jesus' own disciples seem to be offended by his teachings, yet Peter recognizes that in Jesus is the "Holy One of God." In Christ, the dwelling place for God, they have found their home and strength to go on when others have turned back.

August 29

Our first reading will be Deuteronomy 4:1-2, 6-9 as Moses asks the people of Israel to listen and obey the laws of God. In James 1: 17-27, Christians are urged to be doers of the word and not merely hearers. We actively love Christ through our deeds of mercy. A controversy arises in Mark 7: 1-8, 14-15, 21-23, over the failure of Jesus' followers to obey the ritual demands of the Law. Jesus replies that his critics have abandoned the real meaning of the Law for the sake of human tradition.

The Rev. John Shillingburg will be preaching and leading worship this morning.

STEWARDSHIP/GENEROSITY



THOUGHTS ABOUT INTENTIONAL GIVING

Do you want to avert your eyes and draw into yourself when someone says, "Stewardship Campaign?" Would you rather avoid the church's annual pledge drive?

My Pavlovian response is anxiety, as I feel pressured and guilty at the thought of the yearly ritual, even before the campaign starts.

So why am I on the Stewardship and Generosity Committee? When Susan Kulp asked me to join, I tried to figure out how to run away without hurting her feelings. As I tersely informed God about why this was not a good fit (as if God didn't know), I felt a nudge. Despite all of my misgivings, I joined anyway.

First, I had to try to figure out what "stewardship" meant. (I told you being on this team didn't make sense to me.) I surfed the internet, which is both a short-cut for finding applicable Bible verses as well as a way to find out what various people have to say about the topic. Second, I took the same approach relative to "generosity." (Of course!)

Perhaps not surprisingly, I saw that what "stewardship" and "generosity" actually mean is more than, and different from, the images and emotions those words have conjured up for me in the past. It is not only about money, it is not only about church, and it is not at all about someone in the church deciding that I should give and/or do more or differently.

Being a generous steward in our lives as a whole requires each of us to pause and think about how we can best use our personal gifts, time and treasure to live joyfully. After reflecting, we make decisions about how to devote all that we are, and that we have, to being who we want to be and giving of ourselves. We are purposeful in recognizing and choosing how to support our values and priorities.

Sometimes when Stewardship Committees have offered meetings about our use of time, most if not all members have described spending time related to family, work, school, etc., and didn't remember to include church on the list (even active members). When Christians think intentionally about what our lives would be like if we were being generous stewards in all aspects of our lives, church becomes integral to our considerations, rather than an afterthought. It is impossible to separate being Christian from our values and priorities, who we want to be and giving of ourselves!

You know what you do well. You know what you really enjoy doing. You know what financial assets and physical possessions you have. Rather than unwittingly drifting into whatever, or (worse yet) feeling coerced into something, choose to live in all aspects of your life deliberately focused on fulfilling what you consider important and meaningful.

What does ERUCC mean to you? When you imagine your life lived with intention, what is ERUCC's place relative to your gifts, time and treasure? After you pause to reflect, make decisions that are right for you.

During this fall's Stewardship Campaign, I will be able to look the other Stewardship and Generosity Committee members in the eye, and go to church, knowing that my pledge decision is between God and me (and it always was). It is all about living my life as I choose so as to best give of myself to others. When I look at it from that perspective, I feel free and comfortable, not anxious, about a time of introspection and conversation with God about plans for my future!

We become this way when we can't "see in the dark."

2 CORINTHIANS 8:12-15: GIVING SHOULDN'T BE A BURDEN

For if the readiness is there, it is acceptable according to what a person has, not according to what he does not have. For I do not mean that others should be eased and you burdened, but that as a matter of fairness your abundance at the present time should supply their need, that there may be fairness. As it is written, "Whoever gathered much had nothing left over, and whoever gathered little had no lack."

The generosity that we're called to isn't intended to be a burden. It's intended to create a culture of equitability.

September 7 - November 2 God's Promise: I Am with You

God's Promise: I Am with You, takes readers on a journey through scripture to consider circumstances in which God

articulated God's promise of presence. This study does not delve deeply into manifestations of God's presence but rather on God's articulation of God's promise. Light of the World: A Beginner's Guide to Advent Light of the World

In Light of the World: A Beginner's Guide to Advent, author, professor, and biblical scholar Amy-Jill Levine explores the biblical texts surrounding the story of the birth of Jesus. Join her as she traces the Christmas narrative through the stories of Zechariah and Elizabeth, Mary, the journey to Bethlehem, and the visit from the Magi. These stories open conversations around connections of the Gospel stories to the Old Testament, the role of women in first-century Jewish culture, the importance of Mary's visitation and the revolutionary implications of Mary's Magnificat, the census and the stable, and the star of Bethlehem and the flight to Egypt.

What My Grandmothers Told Me

Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, Bathsheba, and Mary—Matthew names these women for a reason. How might Jesus have heard the stories of his grandmothers? What might the young Jesus have felt, as he heard about his family? What might the stories of these women have added to his sense of identity, as part of a particular family in a particular time and place? And what can Jesus's grandmothers-of-the-faith teach us? By exploring these stories together, we will have a richer idea of what the good news is.

March 8 - April 12

Entering the Passion of Jesus by AJ Levine

Jesus' final days were full of risk. Every move he made was filled with anticipation, danger, and the potential for great loss or great reward.

Jesus risked his reputation when he entered Jerusalem in a victory parade. He risked his life when he dared to teach in the Temple. His followers risked everything when they left behind their homes, or anointed him with costly perfume. We take risks as we read and re-read these stories, finding new meanings and new challenges.

In Entering the Passion of Jesus: A Beginner's Guide to Holy Week, author, professor, and biblical scholar Amy-Jill Levine explores the biblical texts surrounding the Passion story. She shows us how the text raises ethical and spiritual questions for the reader, and how we all face risk in our Christian experience.

Controversies in Early Christian History -- Do They Still Matter?



The Wednesday Evening Study Group will begin meeting again in person at 7PM on Wednesday, September 8th. We will be using curriculum based on *The Greatest Controversies of Early Christian History* and *How Jesus Became God* both written and presented in lectures by Bart D. Ehrman, the James S. Gray Distinguished Professor of New Testament at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. The format of the sessions will include a recorded lecture by Prof. Ehrman followed by discussion facilitated by Esther Ziegler. The sessions cover a variety of topics spanning approximately the first 325 years of the Christian era. They range from questions about what the Bible really says about Jesus' birth to how the discovery of the "Gnostic Gospels" cast light on diverse Christian theologies from the 1st and 2nd centuries to how the Council of Nicea in 325 BC was influenced by Emperor Constantine. Join us in learning how Christians from the earliest days struggled to understand who Jesus was and who he is to us as a result of 2100+ years of evolving faith. The topics of each session are listed below.


