TUESDAY MORNING BIBLE STUDY with Pastor Daniel (North Room)

11:00 – Noon Through – March 1 **What My Grandmothers Told Me**

Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, Bathsheba, and Mary—Matthew names these women for a reason. How might Jesus have heard the stories of his grandmothers? What might the stories of these women have added to his sense of identity, as part of a particular family in a particular time and place? And what can Jesus's grandmothers-of-the-faith teach us? By exploring these stories together, we will have a richer idea of what the good news is.

WEDNESDAY EVENING BIBLE STUDY with Esther Ziegler (Trinity Chapel)

The Wednesday Evening Study Group will begin meeting in Trinity Chapel again at 7 pm on February 2nd. At this time we will hear a presentation by Bill Steigelmann on evidence developed by researchers at the U of VA Medical School that reincarnation has been actually happening for at least the past 100 years. Bill is a member of Christ Reformed UCC in Middletown and joined us for our sessions titled The Greatest Controversies of Early Christian History. The idea of reincarnation has been a controversial subject in Christian doctrine so this will be an opportunity to learn a bit about how the topic is being approached in medical research.

On Wednesday February 9th we will begin discussing the book *Freeing Jesus* by Diana Butler Bass. The subtitle of the book is "Rediscovering Jesus as Friend, Teacher, Savior, Lord, Way and Presence" and Dr. Butler Bass presents a chapter on each of those titles and descriptors used for Jesus. Our fall sessions were fairly academically oriented as we explored doctrines about Jesus but this book is more about relationship with Jesus. Participants will be expected to read about 30 to 50 pages of the book each week but the print is fairly large and generously spaced.

January 25 - American Dirt by Jeanine Cummins

Lydia Quixano Pérez lives in the Mexican city of Acapulco. She runs a bookstore. She has a son, Luca, the love of her life, and a wonderful husband who is a journalist. And while there are cracks beginning to show in Acapulco because of the drug cartels, her life is, by and large, fairly comfortable.

Even though she knows they'll never sell, Lydia stocks some of her all-time favorite books in her store. And then one day, a man enters the shop to browse and comes up to the register with a few books he would like to buy - two of them her favorites. Javier is erudite. He is charming. And, unbeknownst to Lydia, he is the jefe of the newest drug cartel that has gruesomely taken over the city. When Lydia's husband's tell-all profile of Javier is published, none of their lives will ever be the same.

February 22 - When No One is Watching by Alyssa Cole

Sydney Green is Brooklyn born and raised, but her beloved neighborhood seems to change every time she blinks. Condos are sprouting like weeds, FOR SALE signs are popping up overnight, and the neighbors she's known all her life are disappearing. To hold onto her community's past and present, Sydney channels her frustration into a walking tour and finds an unlikely and unwanted assistant in one of the new arrivals to the block—her neighbor Theo.

But Sydney and Theo's deep dive into history quickly becomes a dizzying descent into paranoia and fear. Their neighbors may not have moved to the suburbs after all, and the push to revitalize the community may be more deadly than advertised.

When does coincidence become conspiracy? Where do people go when gentrification pushes them out? Can Sydney and Theo trust each other—or themselves—long enough to find out before they too disappear?

Good News, Good Ways Ecumenical Sunday

Today, Ecumenical Sunday, falls smack dab in the middle of the "Week of Prayer for Christian Unity". One of the ways that Christian unity has found an expression is through ecumenical councils and associations. Because of our denomination's prayer that "they may all be one," members of the United Church of Christ are often deeply invested in these organizations.

The Wisconsin Council of Churches (WCC) is headed by Executive Director Rev. Kerri Parker, a United Church of Christ clergy member. Like many such organizations, the WCC generally works on a variety of projects and advocacy locally helpful in Wisconsin. When the council began as in informal gathering of (all male) clergy in the 1930's, those original members could not have imagined that ninety years later their organization would be headed by a woman who would become one of the most dependable nation-wide voices for church leadership during these past years of global pandemic.

The WCC's guide "COVID-19 and our Christian Witness" is a clear and reliable source of information and support that was widely shared and utilized by churches far outside the WCC's usual constituency during the pandemic months. As their website says, "Churches around the world are learning how to be imaginative in their ministry in order to be present to those in need in a time of social disruption. From the experiences of communities facing crises around the world, we know that faith leaders can play a transformational role in calming fear, disseminating accurate information, and modifying religious practices to help keep people safe while providing spiritual care and honoring important community traditions."*

Today, we give thanks for the Wisconsin Council of Churches and their role in being a voice of faith and reason both locally and nationally during the global pandemic. If you are not in Wisconsin, what do you know about the ecumenical organization in your area? What impact are they having, locally or more broadly? How can you be involved in this important work?
