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From Pastor Daniel

I extend my appreciation to all of you who completed the annual Senior Pastor assessment. Feedback is always helpful. I especially appreciate the time many of you took to share comments. I want to respond to those comments and share some thoughts.

A continual theme in the comments for years has been: *"Barbara needs more help."* That reality is not new to me, nor are my attempts and others' attempts to provide that support. You have heard me ask, plead, sometimes even beg for people to serve in leadership.

We have willing workers. Yet, few among us are willing to coordinate or chair our efforts. In 2020-2021, I found myself chairing committees and projects in the absence of anyone willing to chair or co-chair those efforts. This is obviously not healthy for me or for the church.

Recently, I put a request on Facebook for some people to serve on a Kitchen Committee. I was not surprised, yet was still sad that no one offered to serve in this capacity or ask someone else if they would be willing to help in this area of the church's life. This is just one area among several where we have a leadership gap.

For our church to be healthy and faithful, the number of leaders must increase.

I am asking you to prayerfully consider how the leadership skills you are using or have used in the workplace and community can be a blessing to ERUCC's mission and ministry. Your leadership will be welcomed and supported. There are resources for training and orientation. You will receive accolades of appreciation from me and the current leaders for your willingness to share your gifts and time.


This really is not about giving Barbara more help, although I welcome that. More importantly, your willingness to lead will make ERUCC a stronger and more faithful church.

Scripture notes from *Full to the Brim, A Sanctified Art*

APRIL 3: FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT



Focal Scriptures:
John 12:18 |
Isaiah 43:16-21

God is brazen in turning tears into joy. Not so long after their brother Lazarus dies and is raised from the dead, Mary and Martha joyfully welcome Jesus into their home. Mary pours out fragrant perfume (perhaps originally intended to anoint her brother's body after death) and it fills the whole room. This is a brazen act of beauty. Beauty is resistance to death; beauty is an act of love. Her anointing of Jesus' feet is also a public act of worship. Her faith does not hide; it is not frugal. It is embodied, broken open, and poured out. This isn't a frugal faith—it is an abundant, extravagant faith. Mary's act is also risky—she puts her full body into it, sort of like a protest. She exhibits a shameless and brazen faith.

We will be sharing Communion this morning. The Senior Choir will be singing.

APRIL 10: PALM SUNDAY



On Palm Sunday, we shout our praises before quieting our voices to enter into the passion of our God. We will hear of Jesus' entry into

Jerusalem as we read from Luke 19: 28-40 and then of his passion in Luke 22:14 — 23:56.

As Jesus enters Jerusalem, the multitude of disciples begins to joyfully shout with praise. The Pharisees try to silence them, but Jesus responds: "I tell you, even if these were silent, the stones would shout out" (Luke 19:40). All of creation cries out with praise—that message rises above the noise, even if the oppressive powers want to silence it. As we begin our walk through Holy Week, let us ask: What can't be silenced? What must be said? What things can we not stay quiet about? What is bubbling up that we need to give voice to—faith questions, apologies, issues of justice, truth-telling? As we go deeper into the story, the truth will soon be set free.

APRIL 14: HOLY THURSDAY

Maundy Thursday is an alternate name for Holy Thursday, the first of the three days of solemn remembrance of the events leading up to and immediately following the crucifixion of Jesus. The English word "Maundy" comes from the Latin *mandatum*, which means "commandment." As recorded in John's gospel, on his last night before his betrayal and arrest, Jesus washed the feet of his disciples and then gave them a new commandment to love one another as he had loved them (John 13:34). This service has three main parts:

A Service of Light – based on the traditional Vespers service in which we recognize Christ our Light;

A Service of Holy Communion in which we are invited to participate as one of The Twelve at the Last Supper;

A Service of Shadows – Tenebrae – in which we meditate on the Passion of Christ and experience in dramatic form the extinguishing of the Light.

If you are participating in worship on-line, please have a plate with a piece of bread or cracker and a cup with grape juice, wine, or water. You may also consider adding a small bowl with water and a hand towel. During the service, you will be invited to lift the bread or cracker and the cup for a blessing.

Service will be live streamed.

APRIL 15: GOOD FRIDAY

Our services this day focus on the painful journey through Jesus' arrest, trials, crucifixion, and death on the cross. We will read scripture describing the events of this day accompanied by periods of reflection.

If you are participating on-line for the 7:30 service, please consider having a thorn, piece of rope, some fragrant spices, and vinegar available as we will use those objects during the time of scripture readings and reflection.

The 7:30 service will be live-streamed.


APRIL 17: EASTER



The Easter story as recorded by Luke 24: 1-12. Mary Magdalene, Joana, Mary the mother of James, and the other women go to the tomb with spices to tend to Jesus' body. When they find the tomb empty and are stunned by the presence and words of the men in dazzling clothing, they remember. They remember what Jesus said, which compels them to go out and tell the story. Even in utter shock, they return to their deepest knowing and allow themselves to receive the expansiveness of resurrection.

Their imaginations and hearts expand, and they must take action in response. Many of the disciples won't open themselves to this expansiveness and reject it. Peter is curious enough to return to the tomb, and as a result, he is filled with amazement and awe. How do we carry forth what we have learned this Lent? Can we be curious enough to return and remember? Can we allow ourselves to be filled with expansive hope? Can we trust in the expansive promise of new life, and carry that promise with us wherever we go?

Special music will be provided by our brass as well as our vocal choir. This morning Communion will be served as you are seated in the pews.



APRIL 24: HOLY HUMOR SUNDAY

In the time of uncertainty and fear described in John 20:19–31, God's ultimate power is revealed through the wounds of Jesus. Gifts of peace and Spirit are given to Thomas and the other disciples, to empower their witness. Peter dares to give his witness before the leaders of the Jewish Council in Acts 5:27-32.





MAKING A WORLD OF DIFFERENCE ... ONE FAMILY AT A TIME

Beginning last fall, ERUCC began working to help Afghan families settling in Frederick. We work with the Refugee Welcoming Committee (RWC), an interfaith and non-profit group committed to welcoming refugees. The RWC has sponsored five families, ranging in size from a single woman who was an interpreter for our armed forces to a family of four. Each family is settled in a fully furnished apartment with all needed housewares and a full pantry thanks to donations from the community including ERUCC. Each family has an RWC case manager to help them in the early months. The case managers help register children in school, sign up family members for ESL classes, and investigate employment opportunities for the adults.

The RWC Steering Committee is ready to commit to a sixth family as soon as we find an appropriate apartment. Our In-kind Donations Subcommittee is currently organizing the many donations of housewares and furniture. They believe that not only do they have enough for the next three apartments but they have more than enough to share with other organizations sponsoring Afghan refugees. We are pausing donations of furniture and housewares at this time. We are thankful that the Frederick community has been so generous.

APRIL 12 **DANIEL PINK: What regret can teach you about living a good life**

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
