WORSHIP NOTES: MAY 2022 Scripture notes from Seasons of the Spirit

May 1 ~ Third Sunday of Easter

Acts 9:1-20 records Saul's encounter with the Risen Christ on the road to Damascus. Peter, in John 21:1-19, reverses his threefold denial of Jesus (John 18:15-27) with a threefold affirmation of love.

We will be serving communion this morning. The annual meeting of the congregation will follow morning worship.

May 8 ~ Fourth Sunday of Easter

In scripture, we encounter role models of discipleship that are expressed in compassionate words and deeds. Acts 9:36-43 tells the story of one such disciple, Tabitha, who ministers among the widows in her community. In John 10:22-30, Jesus reveals that his works testify to his identity. Jesus' actions reveal who he is.

The Senior Choir will be singing in worship this morning. We will be welcoming Aoife James Menchey Lynch.

May 15 ~ Fifth Sunday of Easter

A person may say, "The road to Hell is paved with good intentions." The wiser one says simply, "The road to Hell is paved." Seductively smooth, wide, and straight it runs, and by comparison, the Holy Way can at times seem like an old cow path meandering through the woods riddled with stones and hanging branches. Yet as followers of Christ, this shouldn't come as a surprise, and the glory of the destination, our joy in the company we keep, and our faith in the One who calls us can make it feel like we're

walking on water. As we read from Psalm 148, Revelation 21:10, 22-22:5, and John 13:31-35, we'll explore what it means to "Go With the Flow" for God.

Rev. Michelle Beadle will be preaching this morning. The Senior Choir will be singing.

May 22 ~ Youth Sunday

ERUCC Youth will be leading worship this morning. Their theme is "What's On Our Minds." Come hear their thoughts about peace, mindfulness, and transitions.

May 29 ~ Seventh Sunday of Easter

In Acts 16:16-34 worship and prayer punctuate this story of liberation and freedom. It begins with Paul and Silas once again on their way to a place of worship and prayer. The story concludes in worship with the baptism of the jailer and his family, now set free from the fear imposed on their lives by the empire's domination, exploitation, and brutality. The power of Revelations 22:12-14, 16-17, 20-21 is not in the drama but in the invitation given to follow in this way of new life and freedom with the One who is the beginning and the end. We are offered the daring invitation to participate in the Spirit's new realm by drinking the water of life, offered as a gift. In John 17:20-26. Jesus' prayer for the community defines this new freedom as life in a relationship with God.

Religious Coalition for Emergency Human Needs

Emergency Family Shelter Opens

The long-anticipated grand opening of Religious Coalition for Emergency Human Needs' (RCEHN) Emergency Family Shelter took place Sunday, February 27 before a gathering of more than 100 people. Religious Coalition Executive Director Nick Brown officially opened the 8,300 sf facility that provides 10 family suites.

"The Shelter will insure a level of normalcy for families that is important to emotional and physical stability," said Brown.

Completion of the \$3 million project took place after years of planning and fundraising under the leadership of campaign Co-Chairs Rev. Dr. Barbara Kershner Daniel and Dr. Greg Rausch, MD, RCEHN board leadership, volunteers, and the dedicated commitment from the multi-denominational faith community. Other partners included The City of Frederick, Frederick County Government, the State of MD, community funders, public, private and indivdual donors. Delaplaine Foundation provided a \$250,000 grant for the Shelter at the start of the project.



"The Shelter will insure a level The 8,300 sf Shelter located on Hayward Road in Frederick of normalcy for families that will serve families in temporary need of emergency lodging.

"Our thanks to everyone in the community who helped make this possible," said Brown, with special acknowledgement to Megan Elizabeth Kula, RCEHN Director of Philanthropy for her leadership of the project, and to Neil Donnelly, Shelter Director.

In addition to the family suites with private baths, the Shelter includes a large community kitchen and living area, a children's play area and counseling rooms. "Parents can prepare meals with their children to be enjoyed in the dining room," said Brown.

How is ERUCC Helping Welcome Refugees to Frederick?

ERUCC is part of the Resettlement Welcoming Committee (RWC), a group of faith and nonprofit communities working together to find housing for refugees, beginning with the Afghan Allies that were evacuated in August 2021. Rebecca Shillingburg represents us; she is one of six people on RWC's Steering Committee. Other groups represented are the Islamic Society of Frederick, the UU Congregation of Frederick, the Frederick Friends Meeting, and the Asian American Center of Frederick (AACF). RWC also has volunteers from many other religious communities.

While RWC is open to working with other resettlement agencies, Lutheran Social Services of the National Capital Area (LSSNCA) opened an office here in Frederick in January and we have been working with them. However, staffing here and everywhere is still a major issue due to the sharp cuts in refugees admitted into the country during the Trump administration. Resettlement agencies everywhere cut back staff and now they are frantically hiring. Until they are fully staffed, RWC is doing much of the work that is traditionally done by a resettlement agency like LSSNCA.

RWC has now sponsored six families. We could sponsor more—there are many families still in hotels—but we struggle to find housing. We are currently working with LSSNCA, the Lutheran resettlement agency in the D.C. area. With the \$1,225 the state department allocates for each person, they guarantee rental assistance for three months plus financial help until state benefits begin. Usually, those benefits begin after a month. LSSNCA applies for these benefits and can offer additional rent assistance if the adults are enrolled in English classes and searching for employment.

How Does RWC Help Refugees?

RWC furnishes refugee apartments with furniture and necessary household items from in-kind donations. The Frederick community has been so generous. We have been able to buy new bedding. Financial donations cover costs for mattresses and will provide rental assistance after money from other sources is no longer available. We stock the pantry with one week's food and welcome the family with a culturally appropriate meal.

RWC volunteers help register children in school, register adults for ESL classes and provide transportation to doctor appointments and ESL classes. There is so much that we need to do that we now have RWC case managers/mentors for each family and may expand that to family teams.

We have a team working on in-kind donations, though we are not taking any more right now. We have a volunteer finding on housing and assisting the LSSNCA's new housing hire as he learns about Frederick. She has found housing for four of our families, which is a major negotiating task with landlords since we want reasonable rent, no deposit, can't guarantee a full year, and usually need it ASAP.

On our recent trip to Franklinton Center, it was determined that it is time to replace the worn original tires. The hitch is damaged and a backup light needs to be replaced.

We are seeking donations to cover the expenses of the purchase of three tires (including the spare) and the repairs. We anticipate that the cost for these items will be around \$800 or less. We also need a new cooler on wheels.



Financial Giving to God Must Include Helping People in Need.

How do you answer your child's call to help a person living on the streets?



We bear witness together to people who are homeless living in Frederick Maryland. When we give to UCC through One Great Hour of Sharing, we are sharing our ministry and resources to help our community's members stay safe, warm, and dry.

Just before the oft quoted statement that Jesus' disciples are to produce deeds, not just words, James reminds people about a brother or sister "without clothes and daily food." James' advice to stay warm and feel full have no value unless disciples help with physical needs. (James 2:14-19-23.)

In his biography of a famous 1840s British explorer, Edward Rice reports on conditions in Baroda, a state in India: "In the eyes of the rulers, as in the eyes of the gods, people ranked below cattle, and kindness to one did not necessitate kindness to the other." "Female infants were disposed of by an overdose of opium or by drowning in a hole filled with milk, for among Hindus girls are a liability." (*Captain Sir Richard Francis Burton* by Richard Rice, pp. 44-45)

When Christians live up to their biblical mandate, such behavior is not possible. Christians cannot with integrity separate faith from action, loving God, and behaving compassionately toward other people. Genuine Christians do not have biblically based faith if their care for the poor and needy is missing in action. The ethical monotheism of both the Old and New testaments says that people who love God point caring hands and generous pocketbooks in the same direction as their minds and mouths.

In what ways do today's Christians affirm and live out the theme that their financial giving to God includes helping people in need?

From Pastor Daniel

Some of you remember Christian Kölzer, who spent a year volunteering with the Religious Coalition from 2006 to 2007. Christian continues to maintain contact with ERUCC and he is my go-to guy for translating communication into German.

Christian and Angelina are the proud parents of two kids. Lotta is 10 months old now and Anton turned four the week before Christmas.

Christian writes, "Monday [April 11] will be the first mask-free day of classes since the beginning of the pandemic, so we'll see how that works. Hopefully, we'll also welcome the first Ukrainians soon. At UNESCO-Schule, which is where I work, we specialize in taking care of students from all around the globe, so we're obviously more than ready to offer those refugees a home away from home. Considering that I speak a good deal of Russian, I'm getting ready for the intake process, etc. when I'm not teaching.

We're basically just waiting for the government to give us the green light. Our congregation, on the other hand, can help more quickly than my school can. So we have been collecting donations, and the first mothers and their children live with people from church now."






MAY 24 While Justice Sleeps by Stacey Abrams
