- Coordinate Monday Mess Hall coordinating meals and some activities during choir practice
- Lead weekly Sunday Worship's "Thought for the Day"
- Lead periodic parent support groups and other parent-focused activities
- Develop special events, e.g., Christmas Eve children's service, Easter egg hunt, Vacation Bible School, etc.
- Recruit and train teachers for Sunday Christian education and Vacation Bible School
- Support the Christian Education Committee in selecting and acquiring curriculula
- Organize multi-generational, congregation-wide activities, such as an annual picnic or other events
- In consultation with and under the direction of the Senior Pastor, represent ERUCC in the wider church and community organizations and events

SEPTEMBER 4

Our first lesson for this morning is Psalm 139:1-6 which speaks of a deeply intimate sense of an individual's relationship to God. In Luke 14:25–33, Jesus teaches about the costliness of discipleship and how the summons to follow calls for personal sacrifice and reshaped priorities.

This morning Communion will be served to you as you are seated in the pews.

SEPTEMBER 11 AND 18

There are 12 minor prophets in the Hebrew Bible, dubbed minor not because they lack significance but simply because the texts are considerably shorter than the major prophets such as Isaiah and Jeremiah. Most of the prophets conveyed a message or messages from God to the people concerning their behavior, most often idolatry. Two, however, were unhappy with God – Habakkuk, and Jonah. On September 11 and 18, we will hear about what they had to say in two sermons entitled Major Minor Messages. Come hear their complaints and God's responses.

Today we will hear from the prophet Habakkuk 1:2-4, 13-14. The Gospel lesson is Luke 12:4-7.

Today we will be hearing from the prophet Jonah 3:10-4:11 and reading from Matthew 5:43-48.

Kirstin Shrom-Rhoads Associate for Faith Formation and Parish Life

Kirstin is an ordained deacon in the United Methodist Church. In the Methodist tradition, a deacon is defined as: An ordained clergyperson who is called to serve all people, particularly the poor, the sick, and the oppressed, and to equip and lead the laity in ministries of compassion, justice, and service in the world. In this capacity, he or she leads the church in relating the gathered community to their ministries, thus connecting the church's worship with its service in the world. A dea-

con has the authority to teach and proclaim God's Word, lead in worship, assist elders in the administration of the sacraments of Holy Baptism and Holy Communion, perform the marriage ceremony where state laws permit, and bury the dead.

Kirstin comes to us as an established leader with 25+ years of hospitality, community-building, leadership, and program development experience gained through ministry and service in a variety of local, regional, and international communities, churches, and organizations. She spent most of her adult life coordinating and leading ministry for children, youth, and families. She writes: "I feel called to be active in nurturing the lives and faith of young people through community, adventure, service, and nature. I am passionate about helping others to experience God's love for them and to begin to identify their own gifts and callings. I also enjoy developing a diverse and inclusive community that supports one another. I participate in intercultural work by creating educational opportunities, developing group covenants, inviting conversations and storytelling, and creating connections in our personal and collective journeys for advocacy and change. It is a most important value to me, both in my job and as a parent, that I help young people to know that God's love for them is abundant, available and filled with grace."

Most recently, Shrom-Rhoads has served as Director of Manidokan Camp and Retreat Center managing daily operations and program development, including the recruiting and training of staff and volunteers. Prior to this, she served as coordinator of Discipleship at Grandview United Methodist Church in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, and Director and Pastor of United Campus Ministry at Millersville University in Millersville, PA. From 2004-2011, she was the Director of Camp Otterbein in Logan, Ohio.

Her direct experience in Retreat Ministry spans many years. Much of it has been in director roles at United Methodist Camps in Maryland, Ohio, and North Carolina. She enjoys planning camps, retreats, and mission/service trips for multiple-sized groups with many different goals.

Shrom-Rhoads completed a Master of Group Counseling and Organizational Dynamics in 1999, a Master of Arts in Religion in 2016 from Lancaster Theological Seminary, and a Certification in Youth and Young Adult Ministry through the seminary in 2016, which culminated in a capstone project entitled, Group Prayer Practices in the Outdoors. She also completed a Certification in Camping and Retreat Ministry through the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry (GBHEM) in June 2017.

Kirstin Shrom-Rhoads is married to Jason Rhoads, and they are parents to two daughters, Emmy and Marley. She enjoys trail hiking and running, contemplative nature photography, and campfire cooking. They are glad to be staying in the area and love that they have the benefits of both the culture and community of Frederick and the beauty and recreation of the Appalachian Hills and surrounding rivers.

Kirstin will begin working with ERUCC part-time through September and then will be serving full-time.

Why the Church has Been Important to My Family

As shared by Marc Kline at the 8:30 a.m. service on July 24

My name is Marc Kline, I currently serve as an elder, personnel committee, and chair of the Spiritual Council. I have served as a deacon, property committee, and other small committees in the past. My wife, Renae and I have been a member of ERUCC for approximately 21 years. We transferred from Christ's Reformed in Hagerstown when we relocated to Frederick, MD in 2001. We had our first child, Ethan in 2002 and our daughter in 2005. I wanted to share why ERUCC is important to our family. When we joined in 2001, it was prior to the tragedies of 9/11. This would be our first encounter with how ERUCC serves as a rock for our community. I recall the shock and uncertainty that had overcome our community and ERUCC had opened its doors to come in and pray. It was a place of comfort and solitude. This would be a prelude to our experience.

My early years didn't have a heavy emphasis on organized religion, but it was encouraged by my grandparents, Gerald and Phyllis Warren. My grandparents were my religious mentors. When I lived with them while attending college, my spirituality only grew. My grandparents were always leaders within the church including property committee, consistory president, and other lay leadership roles.

I share this because when Renae and I came to ERUCC at the urging of Rev. Stevenson, we weren't sure what to expect or what we were looking for in a church. I suspect and feel that we were led to ERUCC. What we found was a welcoming church. I recall our first time visiting and Reverend Wenner was having a talk with a puppet of Jesus. I also recall Beanie saying that "That He doesn't always do this." We met near and dear friends in that first couple of months who are still here today and are still a part of our lives. We found a church community and family.

When I think of our experience at ERUCC, I would say it's like home. Home is where you go to be with friends and family, where you can be yourself, and where you are most comfortable even on your worst day. When you walk through those doors, you are always greeted with a smile and a "how are you." If you have kids, everyone asks how your kids are doing even when your kids are adults.

I would say a majority of our time at ERUCC was with

kids and interacting with other parents, German exchanges which included spending time in Germany as well as hosting German guests, Franklinton center mission trips, mission work in Fredrick, fighting for causes on the front steps, hosting families in our community room and just simply hanging out at multiple church functions is just a sampling of the many opportunities that ERUCC offers to further create a bond within the church.

What I want to especially share with you is that in addition to great sermons, great singing, and great children's programming, ultimately it is the many interactions that I have with friends that rejuvenate my soul. Whether it's driving down to Franklinton Center to do pre-work for our annual trip with the youth, having dinner in the community room as my children practice bells, working on the bathroom floor, or planting shrubs and flowers for the garden, it's the people that I am thankful to call friends that is the most rewarding. Sunday mornings are like family reunions and that is such a blessing. That is what renews my energy and excitement for the future.

So, I have talked a lot about what ERUCC has done for my family but how did ERUCC do this? I learned early on that if you want to get something out of it, you must put something into it. If you want to scale a mountain, you must start with the first step and then the next step. Seems easy but there are a lot of people who can't make that first step. I was one of those people but once I took the first step, it was easy. Serving as a deacon introduced me to Cathie Duncan, who was an awesome teacher and great mentor. When I was asked to participate in the Franklinton Center trip, I was put in charge of repairing a wheelchair-accessible ramp. While that intimidated me and my skill level, Milt Crutchley had complete confidence that I could handle it and I am thankful for his guidance and trust. You see, I had a lot of firsts, and I will continue to have many firsts here but those opportunities are callings. It's God calling us to serve and I am thankful that I answered.

I would like to leave you with these final thoughts. I am forever grateful for my church family and how that has enriched my life but it was that first step that was the most difficult. Don't be afraid to make that first step and if you slip and fall, it's fine because your church family will be there to offer you a hand.

ERUCC members and friends will travel to Kentucky to work with Fuller Center Disaster ReBuilders, a 501(c)(3) Christian or-

ganization dedicated to serving the victims of major disasters in the United States. The group was formed in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina in 2005 and has supported rebuilding after all major hurricanes since. Their clients homeowners are low-income and underinsured. The Fuller Center uses volunteer labor to make rebuilding more affordable and is financed from donations and grants.

On December 10, 2021, Kentucky was hit by record-setting, catastrophic tornadoes. A "long-track" twister was on the ground for almost 200 miles and hit 11 counties, including the small towns of Dawson Springs and Bremen. The Fuller Center is partnering with First Christian Church of Madisonville, centrally located between Dawson Springs and Bremen, to house volunteers and begin rebuilding these communities.

We will be leaving on Saturday, November 12 to drive to Kentucky to enjoy a free evening and Sunday prior to starting work on Monday, November 14. 
The Rev. Daniel Mueller-Thor will lead a group of 20 youth and adults to Frederick October 14-23. We are still working on the program and will have details soon.
