UPDATING THE DONOR WALL - THE JOHN THOMAS SCHLEY SOCIETY

Have you remembered the church in your estate plans? With a planned gift?

In May 2012, the congregation voted to establish the John Thomas Schley Society, to acknowledge and encourage planned gifts for the mission and ministry of Evangelical Reformed United Church of Christ. The Society is named for one founder of our congregation, John Thomas Schley, who provided the vision and leadership for this congregation's establishment in 1745 and served as its primary worship leader and teacher in those early years of the congregation's existence.

YOU CAN RING MY BELL: ERUCC HANDBELLS REFURBISHMENT

As we have heard during our 10:30 am service on several occasions this year, ERUCC has been blessed with a five-octave set of 61 handbells manufactured by the Schulmerich Handbell Craftsmen of Hatfield, Pennsylvania; we purchased a three-octave set in the 1960s and fourth and a fifth octave in the 1970s. Best practice calls for handbells to be cleaned, polished, and adjusted every five years. It appears the last time ERUCC had this service completed was in 2001, meaning that we need now to undertake a Complete Service, which costs \$12,000.

The Consistory unanimously supports this effort, which entails seeking donations from the congregation to fund maintenance of these instruments. We are calling it the ERUCC Handbell Choirs' "Ring My Bell" campaign. Donations of any amount are invited, and in case it is helpful, refurbishing one bells costs \$200. When making a gift to support this project, please note "handbells project" in the memo line or other description field. We hope you will consider joining us to support this important effort.

We will also hold a major fundraising event on Friday, May 5 from 7:00-10:00 pm in the Community Room. The evening will feature a disco-themed celebration centered around our theme of "Ring My Bell." On Palm Sunday, we shout our praises before quieting our voices to enter into the passion of our God. We will hear of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem as we read from Matthew 21: 1-11 and then of his passion in Matthew 26: 14 - 27: 66.

HOLY THURSDAY 7:30 pm Holy Communion and Tenebrae Service in Main Sanctuary and Livestream

Maundy Thursday is an alternate name for Holy Thursday, the first of the three days of solemn remembrance of the events leading up to and immediately following the crucifixion of Jesus. The English word "Maundy" comes from the Latin mandatum, which means "commandment." As recorded in John's gospel, on his last night before his betrayal and arrest, Jesus washed the feet of his disciples and then gave them a new commandment to love one another as he had loved them (John 13:34).

This service has three main parts:

- A Service of Light based on the traditional Vespers service in which we recognize Christ our Light
- A Service of Holy Communion in which we are invited to participate as one of The Twelve at the Last Supper
- A Service of Shadows: Tenebrae, in which we meditate on the Passion of Christ and experience in dramatic form the extinguishing of the Light

If you are participating in worship online, please have a plate with a piece of bread or cracker and a cup with grape juice, wine, or water. You make also consider adding a small bowl with water and a hand towel. During the service, you will be invited to lift the bread or cracker and the cup for a blessing.



Jesus was on his way to the town of Bethany, where his friends lived. He was traveling to Bethany because he heard that his friend Lazarus had died after being sick. Lazarus's sisters, Mary and Martha, had buried Lazarus in a tomb four days ago. When they heard that Jesus was on his way to see them, Mary and Martha went to meet Jesus. They were very sad because their brother had died. They told Jesus, "If you had been here, Lazarus would not have died. You could have saved him! We know you are the Messiah, and you can work miracles." Jesus told them, "Your brother will live again." But they did not understand what he meant. They thought he was talking about life in heaven. Jesus was very sad and began to cry. He asked Mary and Martha to take him to the tomb where they had buried their brother. Mary and Martha took Jesus to the tomb to see Lazarus. When they got to the tomb, Jesus called to his friend who had died, "Lazarus, come out!" And Lazarus came out of the tomb. Since he was still wrapped in burial linens, Jesus told them to take the linens off so he could be free.

FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT

March 26, 2023

John 11:1-45

Breath of Hope

Traveling with his disciples, Jesus learns that his friend Lazarus is ill. Although his friends urge him to go to Lazarus at once, Jesus continues to travel and teach. When he reaches Lazarus's hometown, he meets his friends Mary and Martha, who give him the news that their beloved brother Lazarus has died. Jesus is moved to tears at this.

This is a short recap of a long story that is worth reading in its entirety. You will find in the book of John, chapter 11, if you have not heard it already in worship. As you read, notice that several times Jesus proclaims that the healing of Lazarus will be to show God's glory. This story reveals that God's glory is revealed not only when Lazarus is raised but whenever those who are bound or considered dead are set free.

As far as we know, this is the only time Jesus commands someone to "Come out!" As you read this story, listen! Is The Living Christ saying those same words to you? What death do you need to come out of?

Perhaps it is time to come out of the closet, embracing for yourself and to others in your life the totality of who God made you to be. Maybe it's time to come out of a suffocating relationship, one that stifles your growth and life. Maybe it's time to come out of a job or career, taking new steps into a new life. Maybe it's the right time to come out from under the heavy weight of limits you or others have placed on you because of your abilities.

Listen! Jesus is saying, Come out! because it shows God's glory when you live no longer bound, but as your full and true self.

And pay close attention to the end of the story. After commanding Lazarus to come out, Jesus gives another command to the wider community. They are to help to unbind the resurrected man. So, the process of coming out is not an individual one. It requires the help of a wider supportive community who can provide prayer, assistance, shelter, and encouragement.

How can you both come out yourself and support others in the process of coming out? This is how the glory of God is shown indeed!
