## PERIOD PACKS (MENSTRUAL HYGIENE KITS) SERVICE PROJECT May 14 - June 18

Beginning this Mother's Day, May 14, ERUCC will officially launch a campaign to create period packs to help people in period poverty. These kits promote cleanliness and health during the menstrual cycle. In partnership with Church World Service, the UCC is working provide as many period packs as possible by the end of July as a General Synod service project. Our target date to assemble packs at ERUCC is Father's Day, June 18.
"Period poverty" is defined as a lack of access to menstrual products, hygiene facilities, waste management, and related education. This can result in missed days at school and
 work, discrimination, and social isolation. Recent research reveals that almost two-thirds of women in the U.S. with a low income could not afford menstrual products in the last year, while nearly half had to choose between food and menstrual products.

Needed donation items include the following:

- Regular and super-absorbency tampons
- Sanitary pads (unscented, long, super, ultra-thin)
- Bath-size soaps (3oz. bar or larger, no Ivory or Jergen's soap. Do not remove packaging)
- Packs of flushable wipes (unscented 42-count)

Drop-off bins are located outside the sanctuary and Trinity Chapel. Financial donations directed to ERUCC should note that they are for the "Period Packs Project."

## The Holy Ground Where God Appears

Rev. Traci D. Blackmon, Associate General Minister United Church of Christ
"Do not come any closer," God said. "Take off your sandals, for the place where you are standing is holy ground." Exodus 3:5
Scripture names many places as holy. Yet my heart resonates most with Moses' encounter with the burning bush in Exodus. God appears in the flames of a burning bush that is not consumed. Yet what matters most to me in this text is not where or to whom God appears, but why God appears.

God appears in response to the cries of God's people who are being treated unjustly. God appears because of the people's cries, and wherever God appears is holy ground.
I often have the privilege of standing on holy ground as I travel the breadth of our beloved Church. These are places where God shows up through the work of God's people to treat other's needs as holy.

Plymouth UCC in Des Moines is holy ground, a church that removed the stairs to the pulpit and replaced them with circular ramps, honoring a God who still speaks through preachers and laity who do not stand.

Plymouth Congregational in Kansas is holy ground, a church where one of our unhoused siblings welcomed me to "their church" after worship, before heading back outside by choice with his bags and dog. This reminds us that those unhoused should still have a home with us.

Saint John's UCC in St. Louis is holy ground, a church that partners with the community to feed and clothe those in need of help, and whose members take communion to their surrounding neighbors as an extension of Christ's table of grace.

Trinity UCC in Chicago is holy ground, partnering with the food security network to import organic fruit and vegetables in a neighborhood robbed of access to healthy food options.
Wherever you are this morning, take the time to see how God is moving through the work and witness of those who gather and know that you are, we all are, on holy ground.

The Strengthen the Church Offering reflects the commitment of all settings of the United Church of Christ to cooperatively build up the UCC. The funds raised support leadership development, new churches, youth ministry, and innovation in existing congregations as we work to become a multi-cultural/ multi-racial, accessible to all Christian movement.

Saturday morning, June 3, from 10:00 am - 12:00 pm at the Hill Street Park Pavilion (100 Hill St, Frederick, MD 21703), Frederick's Mom's Demand team will be hosting a \#WearOrange awareness event with their community partner, Heartly House, to raise awareness of the increased lethality of incidents of domestic violence in Frederick County when firearms are involved. Heartly House initiates or implements many of the community gun violence prevention measures that Everytown recommends, including Domestic Violence Danger and Lethality Assessments, Intimate Partner Violence Intervention, and Disarming Domestic Abusers. - In United States, excluding suicides, 2022 brought 20,138 killed through gun violence.
- Nationally, the gun suicide rate is 24,000 persons each year, $70 \%$ of all annual deaths
- In 2022, in the United States we have experienced:
- 648 'mass shootings' [4 or more people shot]
- 2,700+ wounded, 672 deaths;
- 36 mass murders [up $30 \%$ from 2021]
- 332 people were shot on K-12 school properties
- Every day on average (all ages) 321 people in America are shot in murders, assaults, suicides \& suicide attempts, unintentional shootings, and police intervention
- In an average year in Maryland, 796 people die by guns and 1,363 people are wounded. Gun violence costs Maryland $\$ 10.5$ billion each year.


## SUCCESSFUL "RING MY BELL" CAMPAIGN FOR HANDBELLS

As we have heard during our 10:30 am service on several occasions this year, ERUCC has been blessed with a five-octave set of 61 handbells manufactured by the Schulmerich Handbell Craftsmen of Hatfield, Pennsylvania; we purchased a threeoctave set in the 1960s and fourth and a fifth octave in the 1970s.

## Spirit of Witness Mental Health Sunday

"Pandemic has us living at $80 \%$ of our stress capacity. This is why those minor things set us off. We aren't going from 0 to 100 without cause. We are going from 80 to 100 with good reason. If there was no pandemic, the dog incessantly barking might cause usual stress levels to go up 20 points. We get annoyed and yell at the dog with a little more volume than strictly necessary. However, given the $80 \%$ stress we endure as a result of COVID-19, the same constant barking puts us at or over maximum capacity to cope. We might end up crying over the stubborn dog or feeling way more anger than the situation calls for.

Of course, not all of us are in the same boat. Those of us with more resources have an obligation to support those with fewer resources. We need to remember that for some of our neighbors pandemic conditions have elevated their stress levels to maximum; they are coping the best they can. Now is a time to practice compassion and not judgment. Remember that Paul tells us in Romans that we are to "owe no one anything, except to love one another." If you are doing okay today, right now, what can you do to help someone else alleviate some of their stress? Reach out and listen before choosing what to do. Remember that people living alone, single parents, healthcare workers, retail workers, delivery people, people with physical disabilities, people with mental health challenges, People of Color, and many others have increased stress, often more than the 80\% we can attribute to COVID-19.

One of the most often over-looked spiritual need is the need for community. A good spiritual practice is to intentionally connect with a community (church, AA, book club, etc.). Remember that it is okay to be stressed, to be overwhelmed, to feel what you feel in any given moment. It is not okay to ignore the stress, self-destruct, or take out our emotions on another person. We are not alone. God wants us to find life in God's ways even now."*
