

Thank you for worshiping with us this morning. We extend a special welcome to our guests.

For Children: We have trained nursery staff (paid nursery attendant as well as adult volunteers) for ages 0-4. The nursery is located on the first floor outside of the Community Room. (Accessible by the stairs from the Church Street Entrance or via the elevator). Children ages 5 and above are invited to stay and worship with their families. Children's programs, books, and crayons are located in the rear of the sanctuary near the welcome table.

If you are visiting and did not stop at the welcome desk in the downstairs lobby please stop by after the service they would love to meet you or, please feel free to reach out to someone sitting near you and ask them questions about the service or church. Many of our visitors ask us about the time of offering. This is a time in our service when we respond to God's gifts of love by offering the gifts of our lives. For many of us, this is when we make a financial gift towards the ministries and programs of our church. We also use this time to ask God how we might use the gifts of our hands and hearts in sharing God's love. If you are visiting, there is no obligation to give a financial gift. We are just glad you are worshiping with us. At this time, we are taking offering at the end of the service. Plates for offering will be placed at the doors as you exit the sanctuary. Thank you.

We ask that you please silence your cell phones during our worship service. We also ask that you refrain from applause after our choirs sing and allow the music to resonate in the quiet of the sanctuary and in your hearts. Our musicians are playing and singing for the glory of God. They know you appreciate their efforts and their gift.

Worship Next Week: Fourth Sunday after Pentecost

Romans 6: 1b-11 | Matthew 10: 24-39

Jesus taught his disciples, the twelve and those to come, about what to expect because of their faithfulness. He prepares them for rejection, persecution, and martyrdom. At one point he offers the startling statement that he had come not to bring peace but a sword and that families and friends would be divided. The teaching is so stark that it is often ignored, rarely serving as the text in sermons. On this day we will wrestle with the text and reflect why, though uncomfortable, it is important. Have you ever thought about Jesus as a divider instead of uniter?

The Rev. David Cooney will be preaching and leading worship. The Senior Choir will be singing.

This Week at ERUCC

PERIOD PACKS (MENSTRUAL HYGIENE KITS) SERVICE PROJECT May 14 – June 18

ERUCC began a campaign on Mother's Day to create period packs to help people in period poverty. These kits promote cleanliness and health during the menstrual cycle. In partnership

with Church World Service, the UCC is working provide as many period packs as possible as a General Synod service project. We will assemble packs at ERUCC on June 25.

"Period poverty" is defined as a lack of access to menstrual products, hygiene facilities, waste management, and related education. This can result in missed days at school and work, discrimination, and social isolation.




Needed donation items include the following:

- Regular and super-absorbency tampons
- Sanitary pads (unscented, long, super, ultra-thin)
- Bath-size soaps (3oz. bar or larger, no Ivory or Jergen's soap. Do not remove packaging)
- Packs of flushable wipes (unscented 42-count)

Drop-off bins are located outside the sanctuary and Trinity Chapel. Financial donations directed to ERUCC should note that they are for the "Period Packs Project."

In celebration of Juneteenth (Freedom Day), the ERUCC offices will be closed on Monday, June 19.

Juneteenth reminds us that many of the truths of history that we as a nation need to hold close have been hidden to preserve a narrative of racial superiority, progress, and democracy. As a sacred acknowledgement of God's people of African descent, Juneteenth remembers and honors the generations of untold stories that are waiting to be revealed within these sacred lives, stories that reach back to the cradle of civilization on the continent of Africa and reach forward into the abolitionist future we are building.

Ostensibly, when the Emancipation Proclamation was made by President Abraham Lincoln on January 1, 1863, "all persons held as slaves within any State" should have been "then, thenceforward, and forever free." But the historical truth is that there was some distance between the declaration of emancipation and the realization of freedom. Emancipation unfolded, community by community, across the nation over the course of years. In fact, one might say that emancipation is still unfolding in a nation marked by pervasive racialized inequities. The story of Juneteenth shows us that there is often some distance between our declarations of emancipation in our antiracist intentions and statements, and the realization of freedom in our antiracist actions and practices. As faithful people committed to liberation, we will always be on the journey to fully realizing freedom and remembering the truths of our past and revealing the histories that have been hidden is an essential part of that journey.

Sarah Laughed Father's Day

It is not an official church holiday, but many churches today will celebrate Father's Day. In today's scripture story, Sarah is surprised into laughter to find out that she will be a parent. On this Father's Day, recognizing that family is sometimes a source of pain and rejection as well as a haven of joy and acceptance, we give thanks for the many kinds of families that God has blessed. As you say each line of this prayer, silently or aloud, give yourself plenty of time for reflection.

How are these thanksgivings true for you?

How have they or have they not been realized?

What kind of family has God called you into? Consider this question as broadly as possible.

Dear God,

We thank you for our birth family, the family we are linked to by blood. Some of us are very close to our birth family. Perhaps this family is always on our hearts, or even sitting together this very day in this very place. Some of us are far, far away from our birth family, separated by distance or misunderstanding or time or even violence. Whatever our proximity, today we remember that it is our blood family that brought us forth, and we give thanks that we are here.

We thank you for our faith family, for the generations that stretch back further than we can see, even when we stand on tiptoe, peering into the past. We thank you especially for our parents Abraham and Sarah. We thank you that their curiosity, their faith in You, their willingness to follow Your call and their capacity for joy in moments of surprise.

We thank you for the families we have chosen. Those families we have made through law and covenant, families of lovers and friends, families of children and companions. And at the same time, we thank you for the families who have chosen us, drawn us into circles of sweet understanding and easy companionship, taught us to love and to live.

We give thanks for all the families that bring us to laughter, and all the families that we have called home.
