Karen Georgia Thompson becomes first woman to lead UCC, in historic vote

The General Synod of the United Church of Christ made history Monday, July 3, when it elected the Rev. Karen Georgia Thompson as the first woman, and the first Black woman, to lead the denomination as General Minister and President.

Rev. Thompson is the third woman nominated for the post, after the Revs. Yvonne Delk (in

1989) and Barbara Brown Zikmund (in 1999), but the first to be elected. A Jamaican immigrant, Thompson is the third person of African descent to serve as leader of the denomination.

"Today, United Church of Christ, we created a first together," she said after the vote. "It won't be the last first."

She thanked Delk and Brown Zikmund, stating that they "kicked in the doors," paving the way for her election.

"As I stand here before you as your newly and duly elected General Minister and President, I stand here as a Jamaican immigrant woman, a mother and a grandmother, a sister and a friend to many," Thompson said. "... The enormity of this moment will be with me for many years to come."

Her election took place at the UCC's 34th General Synod in Indianapolis, with 626 delegates voting for her election, 43 against and seven abstaining. She will start her new role Aug. 1, taking over from the Rev. John Dorhauer, who has served for the past eight years.

In a prayer after the vote, surrounded by her family, she

Sunday, August 6 Tenth Sunday after Pentecost

Genesis 32:22-32 | Psalm 145:8-9, 14-19, 21

In Genesis 32, Jacob, the trickster, is facing the consequences of tricking his brother Esau for his birthright and his father Isaac's blessing: having to flee to another country, where he meets Rachel, the daughter of his mother's brother. Jacob stayed there for 20 years, marrying Rachel and Rachel's older sister, Leah. When God tells Jacob to return to his ancestral land, he's not expecting a joyous homecoming. Instead, Jacob fears his brother will attack him. Nearing his homeland, he sends his family across the river one night and stays alone beside the river Jabbok.

The Rev. Rebecca Shillingburg will be preaching this morning. Our children will present a special Vacation Bible School song. We will share in the sacrament of Communion at the chancel rail.

Sunday, August 13 Eleventh Sunday after Pentecost

Genesis 37:1-4, 12-28 | Romans 10:8-13

Joseph was the son of Jacob's beloved wife, Rachel, and as such his father Jacob's favorite. Jacob gives Joseph a "long robe with sleeves," a style suitable for royalty, and suggests that Joseph does not have to work like his 11 older brothers. Joseph shares dreams with his brothers, depicting him as ruling over them. Consequently, his brothers hate him, and they conspire to kill him. But they find a less troubling and more profitable alternative--selling him into slavery.

The Rev. John Shillingburg will be preaching this morning. Today we will observe our annual Blessing of the Backpacks. Children, youth, and professionals in education are invited to bring their school bags to worship this morning to receive a special blessing for the upcoming academic year.

Sunday, August 20 Twelfth Sunday after Pentecost

Genesis 45:1-15 | 2 Corinthians 5:16-20

In the years since Joseph arrived in Egypt as a slave, his ability to interpret Pharoah's dreams has made him second only to Pharoah. Using grain reserves stored during years of plenty, he saves the people from seven years of famine. Sent by Jacob to Egypt to buy food, the brothers are bought to Joseph to conduct the transaction. They don't recognize him. After Joseph tests them to determine whether they have changed, he reveals himself to them in a dramatic reunion. He forgives them for selling him into slavery, telling them that what they meant for evil, God meant for good.

Sunday, August 27 Thirteenth Sunday after Pentecost

Exodus 1:8-2:10 | Romans 12:1-8

Four centuries have passed since Jacob's family entered Egypt. A new pharaoh (king) has come to power in Egypt--a new king who does not know the story of Joseph. The Hebrews have become numerous, and the pharaoh sees them as threatening Egypt's security. He orders all Hebrew infant boys to be killed but is frustrated by strong Hebrew women. Two midwives disobey the king's orders and let the babies live; one mother and daughter conspire to save their newborn boy, a boy who becomes Moses.

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

recalled Synod's theme, quoting Revelation 21:5 — "Behold, I am making everything new."

Locally rooted, globally focused

As the denomination's current Officer for global concerns and interfaith relations, Thompson speaks frequently about building connections on all levels.

"Being church means we are locally rooted and globally focused, connecting the issues we see in ways that allow us to bring justice to the world," she has said.

In speaking to the UCC Board before her nomination, she emphasized that dismantling oppressive systems everywhere is necessary for both communities and congregations, internationally and domestically, to thrive.

"Decolonizing the church on all levels has to be a priority," she said. "Decolonizing the church includes our commitment to racial justice and more. Being antiracist and inclusive requires that we decolonize our institutions in ways that afford all to be present and participate equally. This is a commitment to equity for all."

Looking ahead

In her nomination speech to General Synod on June 30, Rev. Thompson spoke about the hope she sees springing forth within the UCC.

"Here is the place where we have seen the Spirit of God poured forth among us in many ways. Here is the place where we continue to identify the many accomplishments of the ancestors. Here is where we honor the resilience of those who came before us, took risk and oftentimes did more with less than we currently have. And here is the place we identify as now, as we ponder the call of God to be salt and light to the world," she said.

Thompson has been serving as Associate General Minister for Wider Church Ministries and Co-Executive for Global Ministries since 2019. She has served in the National Setting of the United Church of Christ since 2009, previously as minister for racial justice and minister for ecumenical and interfaith relations. Prior to joining National Setting staff, Thompson served on staff of the UCC's Florida Conference, as a church planter in Florida and in family ministries in New York.

Thompson holds a doctorate in ministry, with a dissertation in religious multiplicity among African Caribbean people, from Seattle University; a master of divinity degree from Union Theological Seminary; and a master of public administration degree from North Carolina Central University.

The UCC Board will name an interim Associate General Minister to serve in Thompson's vacated position until the following General Synod 35 in 2025.

Alice Brouillet's Estate

Last year we read a meditation of gratitude for Alice Brouillet, who died in 2020 and left a bequest of \$297,178 to ERUCC, a most generous surprise contribution the church did not know was planned. The estate was finally settled in late Spring 2023. The Finance Committee is now contemplating options in terms of how to use the funds to advance ERUCC missions.



The decisions that have been made include:

- Per ERUCC's Financial Policy, a tithe of the gift, \$29,700, has been added to the Mission and Social Justice budget for its use on efforts such as the program to support mental health needs for immigrant youth
- \$50,000 has been included in the 2023 budget to help offset the gap between our mission spending costs and income
- Up to \$15,000 was allocated to pay for Barbara's retirement events, (however, these celebration events cost just \$9,700)

The decisions that have yet to be made are how to spend the balance of \$207,600. Options that have been proposed:

 We have raised about \$155,000 for the historic town clock tower preservation effort and received a \$100,000 Bond Bill. This means we can put down the required 1/3 to start this \$600,000 project, estimated to cost at least \$600,000. Adding \$200,000 from the Brouillet Estate would allow the second payment, meaning we would still need to find the final \$200,000. The Property Committee is awaiting the engineer's structural evaluation report, with a verbal from the vendor indicating the needed preservation work is substantial, making this historic town clock tower effort more urgent.

- 2. Pay off the Fisher Fund loan balance in all or in part. The Fisher Fund Loan balance is around \$173,000. By the end of this year, it will be closer is \$160,000. Paying this off would save \$14,256 annually and reduce total yearly mortgage payments to ACNB and the Fisher Fund from \$153,778 to \$138,778. The balance could be used for future mortgage payments, the United Church Funds Building and Maintenance Fund, paying the primary mortgage principal, and/ or supporting property projects like the historic town clock tower repair.
- 3. A variation on Option 2 is to pay off \$100,000 of the Fisher Fund loan and allocate \$100,000 for property projects like the preservation of the historic clock tower. The remaining balance could be added to the Mortgage Assistance funds to help pay the ACNB loan or placed with existing building preservation funds for future building repairs and maintenance.

Understanding the Trinity historic town clock tower engineering report will be a big consideration in these discussions, the Finance Committee and Consistory welcome your input since we will need to make this decision soon. Finance Committee Chair Will Duncan, Treasurer Rodney Martin, and I are often on hand before and after Sunday services. If you want to email me, please do so at pbrehm@comcast.net.
