We, the members of this congregation, seek to celebrate in word and deed the gospel of Jesus Christ, by nurturing spiritual growth through worship, study and prayer; by caring for one another as God cares for us; and by proclaiming God's love for all people as we work to help our neighbors near and far. Consecration Sunday is Coming

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather,

such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

Our congregation's stewardship and generosity committee has selected the Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During morning worship on Consecration Sunday, October 8, we will ask our attendees and members, in person and online, to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and worldwide.

Every attendee and member who completes an Estimate of Giving Card does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done so that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

You will not receive an Estimate of Giving Card in the mail before Consecration Sunday. During morning worship our guest leader will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration Sunday team, Consistory members, and committee chairs. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship.

As I begin my service as the UCC's general minister

and president, I am moved to reflect upon the extraordinary generosity of our donors. Our local church members, conferences, churches, and community members have all contributed to the building of the kindom of God for such a time as this. During my 14 years of service at the UCC national setting, especially in my last role as Associate General Minister of Wider Church Ministries, I have been awestruck by your tremendous response to our Disaster Ministries' appeals. Restoration Update on Frederick's Town Clock Tower

Our Trinity Chapel restoration project of Frederick's town clock tower continues. As reported in Thursday Thoughts, a structural engineer examined the tower in order to prepare a detailed report with findings and recommendations. An initial verbal report from the engineer indicated the need for the restoration is more imminent than originally thought. The engineer found significant rot in several of the large structural beams that support the wooden structure atop the 1763 stone tower.

The engineer's report suggests that restoration work begin as soon as possible. We have already raised some of the projected costs of the restoration project, but know that we will need to raise more once we get an updated quote based on the engineer's report.

We are planning to share more information at a special meeting soon. Look for an announcement in the worship bulletin and Thursday Thoughts.

For us, this day marks the return of children, youth, and adult faith formation opportunities, including Children's Sunday School with classrooms for kids Pre-K-2nd Grade and 3rd-5th Grade and a Youth Sunday School class for 6th-12th Grade, as well as a restart of the Sunday morning Let's Study the Bible class for adults. Our popular Junior Church has been re-imagined and will also begin again during worship for children aged 5-5th grade.

Did you know that ERUCC is part of an air quality monitoring network?

Last fall, ERUCC joined an air quality monitoring collaboration between the Central Atlantic Conference of the UCC, Interfaith Power and Light (DC.MD.NOVA), and the Center for Community Engagement, Environmental Justice, and Health (CEEJH) from the University of Maryland. A common assumption is that persons living near heavy industry, highways, and traffic experience poor air quality, have lower incomes, and are likelier to be persons of color. And because research has shown that poor air quality leads to higher incidences of asthma and related respiratory diseases, persons in these areas are more likely to have chronic illnesses. However, data is needed to verify these assumptions.

Federal government air quality monitoring data is available through airnow.gov, home of the US Air Quality Index. Most days, most Maryland zip codes have good air quality indexes. However, measuring the air quality for an entire zip code masks areas experiencing poor air quality. To get more precise data at a microgrid level, air quality monitors were placed on UCC churches throughout the region. ERUCC received a monitor last winter. While many monitors were placed at UCC churches in Baltimore, ERUCC was chosen as an urban site that lacked the risk factors of heavy industry, traffic, and highways to serve as a contrast. Data is now coming in that will allow researchers to identify areas of concern and work with the affected communities to find solutions.

Do you ever feel overwhelmed by the horrific news on climate change?

Sometimes we tune out and ignore it all. We can do that because we are exceptionally blessed. Here in our Goldilocks land, it's not too hot and not too cold, not too wet and not too dry. At least that is true compared to many places. We are largely spared the extremes happening elsewhere. Even so, our actions make a difference and our faith calls us to care for the earth and all its inhabitants.

Instead of tuning out or becoming overwhelmed, action is a healthy antidote to all the bad news. When we act, we have agency and make a difference. When we act, we become more hopeful, which is good for the earth, for our fellow humans and for our own mental health.

ERUCC is full of opportunities to act and live in hope. Here are some actions we are taking to uphold our pledge as a Creation Justice Church.

- Recycling and Composting
- Native plant gardening
- Community solar for electricity
- Air quality monitoring
- Energy efficient lighting
- Advocacy through Climate Hope postcards to the EPA and other opportunities
- Spiritual walks
- Collaboration with community organizations that care for the environment



Reflections from Intercultural German Exchange Program



In July, ERUCC sent a team of twelve, including nine youth and young adults, to Eastern Germany for our annual intercultural exchange program through our partnership with congregations in Klein Schwechten. We represented our church as we celebrated and journeyed together for our 10th year! Continue reading for a sampling of reflections on this year's exchange.



This trip to Germany was one to remember. As my last trip, it was a completely positive experience. I saw the church where Martin Luther nailed up his 95 theses, which allowed me to ponder the accuracy of history and the dynamics of historical questioning. We were also able to visit the Bundestag and meet with one of the German parliament members. It was such an interesting conversation, and I really appreciated the opportunity to learn how the German government functions and how it differs from that of the United States. I loved spending time with my wonderful host family and all our other wonderful German friends. I had a great time! – Alex Cumber, college student



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Our trip to Klein Schwechten to celebrate the 10th year of our partnership was simply a fantastic trip. On July 9th, we celebrated our 10th anniversary with a service where we presented our German host with the hand-print decorated alter cloth as a symbol of our church and community support of this unique partnership. The following day, we went to Prora, located along the Baltic Sea, to explore the region's history and environment. We had the opportunity to study the environment by picking up garbage along the coast and then, categorizing it and providing that information to the local government. While at Prora, we explored the forest and tree canopies on a unique walk that took us above the canopies on a boardwalk that reached a height of 140 feet. Then, to finish up the environmental aspect of our trip, we had a very informative two-hour tour of a waste-to-energy plant. This plant took in all the trash for the entire region, creating heating and electricity. We had a day trip to Berlin to visit their parliament building, the Reichstag, Brandenburg Gate, Checkpoint Charlie, and the Berlin Mall.

I think more important than all else, we established new and existing bonds with our friends and partners in Klein Schwechten. These relationships were strengthened as we visited local sites and enjoyed each other's company at their dinner tables and the BBQs. This relationship is still strong and will continue as we start planning for their return to the US in 2024.

While in Germany this year, we did many new things, as always! We traveled to the Baltic Sea, got to do a tree walk at one of the highest points on the island of Rügen, and went to several museums-in Berlin and in Rügenthat highlighted historical events of WW2 as well as the unification of Germany and the Berlin wall. For me personally, the biggest things that stand out about this trip have more to do with social and cultural themes. I think a lot about the difference in food, because I love food, and how their main courses have a lot of potatoes and meat. In America, I notice a lot more variety in types of food and also more vegetables in main meals. There's much exposure to how they have grown up in terms of privacy, social standards, and general interactions, which I found intriguing to learn about; although that is often uncomfortable, it is a necessary experience. The biggest takeaway from this for me was after taking a semester of German in college and then entirely forgetting the language, how quickly I adjusted to remembering what I had learned and being able to use it in conversation. They're really not kidding when they tell you to become fluent in a language, you need to go live there.

I could not have had a better trip to be my first one to Germany! Our students participated in this intercultural experience excitedly, since most were returning, with great anticipation for reconnecting with friends. The theme for the year was Faith, Peace, Earth. We were treated to some unique experiences of walking up into the trees on a circular boardwalk, eating ice cream many times (YUM!), learning how the villages began, seeing the Wittenburg Cathedral where Martin Luther nailed the 95 theses that challenged the Catholic church, having a Q&A with a senator from the region where our host families lived, visiting and hearing stories about the Berlin Wall, and learning about the history of Prora from the Nazi working-class vision for leisure through to being a youth hostel and luxury apartments today! These experiences evoked both an intellectual interest and an emotional/spiritual response.

As our activities included exploring earth and conservation themes, I continued to wonder about being a good neighbor. How are we good neighbors in general? How are we good neighbors to the earth/environment? And how are we good neighbors to our friends and partnership churches worldwide in Germany?

I look forward to helping in the coming years as our groups learn more about each other's daily lives, explore social trends in society, and participate culturally in local and regional celebrations! As our Klien Schwechten churches change in leadership, we pray with positive anticipation that this project will continue to be valued in their faith community just as it is in our own.

Reflections on General Synod 34

The last time I was at Synod was four years ago, and a lot has changed, not just because I am no longer a 'Youth at Synod.' Our resolutions this Synod pushed the church to be more open-minded, accepting, and forward-thinking than ever. The newest and most significant change was a change to the bylaws, resulting in Synod being every three years instead of two. I ended up voting no, and while I will not go into the details of why in this reflection, I wanted to touch on how the no votes were handled, as I was impressed. The new change needed two-thirds support to pass, and the vote passed by ONE vote. If one person had changed their mind on the yes side, the change would have failed. A group of those in opposition put forth a resolution based on the dissenting opinion, outlining why the opposition did not vote for the resolution, and the UCC allowed the resolution to go forth. This was an incredible act of generosity by the delegates at General Synod. At that moment, I was proud to be a member of a community that cares about its minority just as much as it cares about its majority.

I am now entering my final year as a public policy major, and what better way to dip your toes into policy work than at Synod? As a delegate, I found it fascinating to debate, revise, and vote on resolutions that impact our community. There is a sense of purpose over those five days, where every delegate knows a 30-minute debate over something as small as an inserted comma is meaningful and welcomed. I am proud to be a part of a community that appreciates the need for reviewing details, whether big or small, because, to someone, those small details matter. In plenary, you can feel the passion for progress, and I know the church is moving forward.

Synod isn't all business. It also serves as a meeting space for friends across the globe. As a relatively new attendee at Synod, I enjoyed watching old friends reunite for the first time in years. I attended Synod fully believing I would be there to do business, and trying to branch out and make some new friends was a secondary objective, as I still don't know many UCC members outside of my home church in Frederick. Yet, I was surprised when I encountered another Youth-at-Synod member from four years ago, my friend Kate. And let me tell you, reuniting with old friends at Synod is even better than watching others do it. Kate is from the Wisconsin Conference and attended as a delegate as well, and it was a delight to have a friend to enjoy Synod with. As I said, Synod isn't all business. Synod is the connection between all parts of the UCC and is where you are reminded that you belong, not just in your own church but in every setting of the United Church of Christ.



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Children and Youth Ministry

The ERUCC Sunday School program is thriving! We are seeking volunteers to join our excellent team to accommodate the growing number of children. Sharing in the nurturing and teaching of children is a joy and honor. We would love to have you join us.

Our Sunday School programs for Pre-K-5th Grade runs from 9:30-10:10 a.m. in the Thomas Room and Liz Coffey Room, followed by Music and Movement in the Liz Coffey Room from 10:10 - 10:25 a.m. The Youth Sunday School meets from 9:30 - 10:20 a.m. in the Clapp Room in the Church Office. Children aged 5 -5th Grade are dismissed from the sanctuary after Thought for the Day during the Worship Service for Junior Church in the Thomas Room. Each class is led by at least two teachers. An age-appropriate curriculum provides weekly lessons, including Bible lessons, crafts, and activities. The students also often participate in projects that put faith into action. All persons working with children are trained in our safety protocols and procedures.

NEEDED: Substitutes for the combined Pre-K through Grade 2 class

If you volunteer to be a substitute, you will assist an experienced teacher by helping with check-in and dismissal procedures, crafts, snacks, and classroom management.

NEEDED: Co-teachers, assistants, and substitutes for Grades 3-5

The co-teachers of this class have multiple child/education-related responsibilities at ERUCC on Sundays, and we are seeking additional teachers and assistants to rotate into the classroom so that they are not committed to teaching every week. By volunteering for this age group, you would help us develop depth in our teaching capacity. As a new co-teacher, assistant, or substitute, you would follow the lead of an experienced teacher.

NEEDED: Substitutes for Middle School/High School Youth Class

Teachers at this level should be comfortable meeting students where they are, going off-topic to follow the students' interests, and encouraging learning by asking deep questions related to the student's interests and following a curriculum. A goal is to make connections between life and faith.

NEEDED: Assistants for Junior Church – During the 10:30 a.m. service

Our lead teacher for Junior Church needs at least one assistant each week. Junior Church is offered after the Thought for the Day during the 10:30 a.m. service and is open to all children aged 5 - 5th grade. An assistant is needed to help shepherd the children from the sanctuary to the classroom, check-in students, distribute materials, and help with classroom management. Volunteering to be an assistant once a month would be a great help!

NEEDED: Nursery Assistant

Our Nursery Attendant needs at least one assistant each week. The nursery is for our youngest children from birth through Pre-K. Volunteering once a month or every other month would be most helpful.
