

n the months ahead, the Stewardship Generosity Team invites ERUCC members to consider how we are engaged in the church's work—and how we might invite others to join us.

I am most actively engaged in the life of ERUCC as an Elder and as President of the Consistory. In those roles, I prepare for the Early Service on a rotating basis and help the Nominating Committee and the other standing committees. I have also participated in other aspects of the congregation's daily, weekly, monthly, and annual activities.

I've learned that it takes the entire congregational family to accomplish our mission. Congregational life requires many people to undertake many tasks, the coordination of which requires lots of communication, cooperation, grace, and even a sense of humor. These tasks include:

- Compiling, designing, and printing the bulletins,
- Setting up the sanctuary for the 8:30 and 10:30 services, including lighting altar candles and putting hymn numbers on the hymnal boards;
- Recruiting volunteers and confirming schedules for the Nursery;
- Preparing for and teaching Sunday School classes for children, youth, and adults;
- Recruiting volunteers and creating schedules for the Welcome Table, Greeters, and Deacons;
- Managing, maintaining, and running sound and streaming for services and events;
- Preparing communion elements and cleaning up afterward;
- Counting and recording offerings; and
- Preparing, serving, and cleaning up our Fellowship times.

These are just some of the many tasks—visible and behind the scenes—required each Sunday, most of which are the congregation's responsibility.

When I engage in these tasks, I often engage with other members, which not only fosters relationships but also allows me to be a part of a broader community focused on giving glory to God and serving our neighbors. And, more often than not, these tasks are interesting, fun, and offer a feeling of accomplishment. What any one of us can accomplish individually is small; what we can accomplish through collaboration with others is greater and more powerful. Even repetitive tasks—garden committee projects, fellowship, and many others that are not oneand-done—can be deeply satisfying.

Participating in the life of the congregation allows us to give back to God. As wise ancestors have noted, to whom much is given, much is expected. I am blessed with health, time, and resources to give to the church's life, and it brings me joy to do so. I hope and pray that you find the same satisfaction in being part of our congregational family.

I have focused my thoughts here on just the "internal missions" we have—roles and responsibilities we undertake to further our congregation's spiritual and operational needs. I could write a second essay on how all this applies also to our "external" mission efforts to help our friends and neighbors in Frederick, the United States, and the rest of the world.

Each of us may have a different perspective on the efforts and benefits that can be received by participating in the life of ERUCC. As we close out 2023 and enter into a new year, I invite you to reflect on your time, skills, and interests and how you might steward them to engage in the life and missions of our congregational family.

ADVENT AT ERUCC

"Two people one radiating joy & the other wading into weariness hold the world together."

hrist was born into a weary world. King Herod ruled the land with a legacy of ruthlessness. The Romans treated the people of Israel with contempt, imposing harsh taxes and land seizures that forced many into subsistence farming. Poverty and destitution were pervasive. And yet, Christ was born, bringing good news of great joy for all people.

As Advent comes again to a weary world, we ask, "How does a weary world rejoice?" From the opening chapters of Luke's Gospel, we have found a few answers: we acknowledge our weariness, we find joy in connection, we allow ourselves to be amazed, we sing stories of hope, we make room, we root ourselves in ritual, and most importantly, we trust our belovedness. In the parallel birth stories of Jesus and John, joy arrives—despite trepidation, fear, or grief. In these stories, we find rhythms for rejoicing. As we move through our series, we hope to create space for acknowledging the weariness of our world while celebrating God's closeness with great joy.

And so, we will hold space for our weariness and our joy. We will seek a "thrill of hope" in our hurting world. We will welcome joy—even if, like the prophet Isaiah, we cry out for comfort (Isaiah 40:1). In this weary world, may we find many ways to rejoice.





We acknowledge our weariness Psalm 80:1-7, 17-19 | Luke 1:1-23

As Advent begins, we start by acknowledging the weariness, grief, rage, and hopelessness we carry-and we also affirm that we are made for joy. Joy is designed to live in a full house of other emotions. We start the season with Zechariah and Elizabeth; they have battled infertility and have lived many years steadfast in their faith. Perhaps they feel the weight of hopes and dreams unattained. The angel comes to Zechariah with promise of good news, but Zechariah can't fully receive it, and he is cast into silence for the duration of Elizabeth's pregnancy. Sometimes weariness can harden us and prevent us from living fully. We've had hard journeys. Grief has left a scar on us. This is how we show up to Advent. Let us acknowledge the ways we, too, are hardened by disbelief. Like the psalmist, let us ask, "how long?" and plead for restoration.

The Rev. John Shillingburg will be preaching. The Senior Choir will be singing, and the Cambridge Bell Choir will offer special music. Communion will be shared at the chancel rail.



December 10 Second Sunday of Advent

We find joy in connection Isaiah 40:1-11 | Luke 1:24-45

In community, our joy expands. When we can't rejoice, we can carry each other's joy. That is what Elizabeth and Mary do for each other. The good news begins to take shape in Elizabeth's womb, but scripture tells us that she stays secluded, hiding her pregnancy from others—that is, until Mary arrives at her door, also pregnant. Perhaps Mary's arrival is the inbreaking that changes everything for Elizabeth, for in that moment, her child leaps in her womb and she is filled with the Spirit. She can't help but rejoice. Her joy is contagious and wraps around Mary like a hug. Through the prophet Isaiah, we hear God speak tender words of comfort; this is the comfort we can give to and receive from each other during this season.

The Rev. David Cooney will be preaching. Spirit will be sharing in music leadership this morning.







December 17 Third Sunday of Advent

We allow ourselves to be amazed Psalm 126 | Luke 1:57-66

After Elizabeth gives birth, her neighbors and family celebrate with her. When it comes time to name the child, Zechariah affirms the name given by the angel and by Elizabeth. In that moment of affirming the promise, Zechariah's speech is restored. Everyone is filled with awe. How often do you allow yourself to be amazed? Wonder is all around us—can we recognize it? As we learn how to rejoice in a weary world, can we live in a way that allows amazement and wonder to surprise us often? In Psalm 126, those who expect to reap tears are granted a surprise: shouts of joy. Amazement is a balm for the weary.

The Rev. David Cooney will be preaching. The Senior Choir will be offering their Christmas Cantata – **The Winter Rose**, by J.M. Martin, this morning.



December 21 7:30 PM Longest Night Service


December 24 How does a Christmas Eve 10:30 AM We make room Luke 2:1-20

Luke's Gospel tells us that when Mary gives birth to Jesus, she lays him in a manger, for there was no place for them in the guest room. Scholars argue about where, exactly, the birth occurs—and why. Was it in a stable or the living room of a simple peasant home? Was Bethlehem teeming with visitors who were also there to be counted in the census? Was Joseph's family inhospitable because they disapproved of his marital situation? Regardless of where the birth occurs, we know that Christ is born in a crowded, unlikely place. And yet, God makes a place here anyway. God draws the circle wider as shepherds and unexpected guests arrive. This Christmas, let us also make room—for strangers and neighbors alike. For this is good news of great joy for all people.

Today we celebrate our annual Lessons and Carols service with our college students reading the scriptures. The Rev. David Cooney will be leading us in worship. The Senior Choir will be singing and the Cambridge Bell Choir will offer special music.

December 31 First Sunday after Christmas

We root ourselves in ritual

Luke 2:21-38

After eight days have passed, Mary and Joseph circumcise their child and give him the name Jesus. They return to the temple in Jerusalem to enact the sacred birth rituals of their culture and tradition. While they are doing what is customary, the unexpected occurs. A man named Simeon is led by the Spirit into the temple to proclaim Jesus as the "light of revelation." Then, a prophet named Anna suddenly approaches them; she praises God and speaks about Jesus to everyone longing for redemption. Rituals mark sacred turning points in our lives. They can help us make meaning of celebrations, losses, and transitions. As new parents to Jesus, Mary and Joseph could feel weary for what lies ahead, but perhaps these sacred rituals— and those who bear witness to them—bolster them and give them courage for the journey. How do our sacred rituals root us and help us live into new chapters with courage?

The service will conclude with the "Letting Go and Letting God" ritual. This is a time when the congregation will be invited to write down on a piece of paper those things which each person wants released from the old year of 2023, receive God's grace and move into the new year with divine blessing and hope. The pieces of paper will be placed in a bowl of water at the front of the chancel where they will disolve.

We trust our belovedness Luke 3:21-22




Candlelight Tour of Historic Houses of Worship

Grief and the Holidays: Five Tips to Help You Cope

- 1. Acknowledge your loved one's presence and absence.
 - a. Do something to acknowledge and remember your loved one. In other words (pardon the poor grammar), "Don't do nothing!"
 - b. Hold a moment of silence, say a prayer, light a candle, arrange a place setting, share memories, visit a gravesite, etc.
 - c. Have a family meeting (include children) to identify ways to acknowledge your loved one. Create one or two new rituals or traditions.

2. Accept help. Ask for help. Delegate.

- a. Utilize the resources and supports available to you (extended family, close friends, neighbors, community groups, religious organizations, school community, etc.)
- b. Accept offers to babysit, help with cleaning, prepare meals, have someone else host, etc.
- c. Task others with baking, decorating, and gift wrapping. Consider shopping online, or not at all.

3. Create new traditions.

- a. Let go of the idea that everything has to be ok, everything is not ok.
- b. Keep some old traditons, and create some new ones.
- c. Don't forget (or be afraid) to involve children in the planning. Ask them for suggestions and ideas.

4. Prepare for social interactions.

- a. Manage isolation. Accept at least one invitation to attend a social gathering, and give yourself permission to decline others.
- b. Be prepared/plan ahead for interactions. Grant yourself permission to decline invitations to triggering conversations. "I'd rather not talk about that right now."
- c. Develop a "back door plan" and prepare for inadvertently unhelpful statements from others.

5. Take care of yourself.

- a. Maintain routines: drink water, eat meals, take vitamins/medications, exercise, leave the house, go to bed on time, obtain sleep, etc.
- b. Allow time to sit with your grief feelings and allow breaks from active grieving. We need both.

We will leave early on Saturday, January 13, and return later on Monday, January 15 (time to be determined as we choose projects).

Attend an interest meeting in the Community Room on Sunday, December 17, at 9 AM or immediately following the 10:30 AM worship service. A final preparation meeting will be on Sunday, January 7, after we put Christmas decorations away following worship. Youth who will be attending the work trip to Franklinton Center at Bricks and their parents must attend this meeting. We will discuss expectations, work assignments, travel, packing, and food menus.

The Franklinton Center at Bricks is a conference, retreat, and educational facility in eastern North Carolina focusing on justice advocacy and leadership development. Franklinton Center is a historic center of transformation where issues affecting the marginalized, the oppressed, and the poor are addressed.

A former plantation, Franklinton Center traces its beginnings to the founding of Franklinton Christian College in 1871 and the Congregationalist Bricks School in 1895. A merger of those two schools in the 1950s formed Franklinton Center at Bricks. The Center is related to the United Church of Christ and is managed by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries.

As with all church buildings, the more work a volunteer group can provide to maintain facilities, the more funds are available for programs and meeting the direct needs of people.



Statistical Report on Consecration Sunday Results

A total of 92 giving units (households or single persons) completed Estimate of Giving Cards this year.

A total of 60 of these giving units increased their financial commitment above their last year's amount.

A total of 62 giving units present to fill out Estimate of Giving Cards on Consecration Sunday committed a total of \$299,054.

Based on last year's giving records, we can expect to receive \$102,815 during the coming year from people who have consistent giving patterns during the past twelve months but have not yet completed Estimate of Giving Cards.

Based on the average total of loose offerings during the past three years, we can expect to receive \$2,629 during the coming year from that source.

Church income from non-donor sources such as interest, rentals, and fees is expected to be \$243,594. This gives us a grand total of \$782,168 anticipated income for the next twelve months.

The total income for our general operating budget during the last twelve months was \$736,797.

Next year, we can expect our operating budget income to increase by \$45,371.

This is a 6.15 percent increase in total giving above last year (as of November 15, 2023).
