


STRETCH OUT YOUR HAND



Thank you for worshiping with us this morning. We extend a special welcome to our guests.

So let us now turn to confession to tell the truth of our lives—to trust that even here, God's love is boundless. Let us pray:

*PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Divine Creator, we come before you with humble hearts, acknowledging our shortcomings and seeking forgiveness.

We confess that we have subjected others to the kind of rejection and misunderstanding that you yourself experienced in the form of Jesus.

We try to control the paths of those we love, deeming them unworthy of

acceptance when they veer from our expectations for how they "should" be or whom they "should" love. Meanwhile, in moments of doubt, we have sometimes sought approval from those who do not understand our truth instead of finding solace in the chosen family you have blessed us with.

Have mercy on us when we have believed what others say about us rather than what you promise. Have mercy on us when we have caused others to doubt your love.

Forgive us for the times when we have allowed ego to overshadow our ability to extend solidarity and support to our most marginalized siblings.

Help us to use whatever privilege or advantage we possess to uplift the voices of those who are vulnerable and oppressed. Grant us the courage to stand in solidarity with our queer and trans siblings. In times of fear and uncertainty, may we find solace in your promises.

Strengthen us with the knowledge that you will always take us in and hold us close, especially when we feel alone or misunderstood by those we hold dear.

Help us to live authentically and boldly as the children you created us to be. Give us courage to trust our belovedness. Strengthen us to embody your love and courage in all that we do. May our lives be a reflection of your boundless love and embrace. In your holy name we pray. Amen.

*ASSURANCE OF PARDON

Siblings in Christ, as long as we live on this side of heaven, there may be days when self-doubt and insecurity creep in or moments when fear and external pressures threaten our courage. There will surely be days when we fail to believe our own belovedness or affirm it in those around us.

Even still, the promises of God are for us. Though the road is long and difficult, nothing can separate us from God's love—not religious doctrine, not denominational decisions, not a person's unbelief, not even our own fears. Friends, each day is a new chance to affirm life, to start over, and to love more fiercely. We are being renewed daily. This is our hope.

Next Sunday: June 9 – Third Sunday after Pentecost

1 Samuel 8:4-11, 16-20 | Mark 3:20-35

Leadership is a daunting task. Responsibility upon responsibility is overwhelming, and the desire to accomplish often threatens what is best for those whom we lead. It is natural to look at the examples of our heroes, but authentic leadership comes when the Holy Spirit guides us. Leadership is redefined when we follow first. We are presented with an example of God's Spirit leading in ways that are subversive to human expectations in Mark 3:20-35. The mark of God's leadership seems to be a reversal of human ways. What does that reveal about your perspectives on leadership? Where do you see God's upsidedown work in the world?

Spirit will be sharing in music leadership this morning. You are invited to wear orange as a public witness in support of gun violence prevention.

ABOUT PRIDE SUNDAY

The first Pride marches were held on June 28, 1970 in cities around the United States, on the one year anniversary of the Stonewall Uprising. Thousands of LGBTQIA+ people gathered to commemorate Stonewall and demand equal rights. Invisibility was not an option anymore. Within a few years, gay rights organizations were founded throughout the world.

Both Pride and worship are acts of celebration and protest, acts of remembrance, and enactments of a world where all belong. We practice these acts in a world where the safety and rights of LGBTQIA+ people are threatened each day. On Pride Sunday, we cry out for justice and rejoice in the beauty of our embodied selves. We remember the suffering of those who came before us and imagine new ways of loving ourselves and our neighbors.

Pride Sunday is a celebration of the image of God in everyone and the diversity of humanity. In the beginning, when God breathed the breath of life in us, God blessed us and called us very good. There is no better way to celebrate the fact that we were created in the image of the Divine than by being unapologetically ourselves and becoming the people God called us to be: authentic, whole, complex, and made to love, even when others say, "they have gone out of their mind" (Mark 3:21).



June 2, 2024 Mark 2:23-3:6

"Stretch Out Your Hand"

Today's passage from Mark contains two short stories about how the presence of Jesus reveals the reign of God in ordinary things. The first story concerns feeding people on the day of rest, which violates the strict laws of the religious leaders of the time. The second begins on the same day, with Jesus going to the place of worship, again.

You might skip quickly over the again that starts the story in order to get to the main action of the story when a man with a "withered hand" is healed by Jesus, another act on the sabbath day that draws the ire of the authorities.

But let's pause here, on the again. The again tells us that this is not the first time that Jesus and the people with him have gathered here, at the place of worship. Is it the first time that they saw the man with the withered hand? We don't know. In fact, we don't know very much about the man, except for that one descriptor.

Perhaps the man had been "withered" since birth, and had taken up residence in the temple, impoverished and hoping to beg or borrow enough money for his sacrificial offering. Maybe the man was a busy and wealthy landowner with a recent injury who had just popped into the temple to see what all the fuss about this new teacher was about. Maybe he himself was one of Jesus' followers, and his hand was only the object of attention for the first time that day.

But, poor or prosperous, connected or lonely, we know that he did not ask for healing. Again, we don't know why. Maybe he had been coming to the temple every day for years hoping for healing that never came until he just gave up. Maybe he did not ask for healing because he felt he did not need it. Or maybe he did not ask, because he hadn't yet worked up the courage. But whatever his reason, Jesus offered healing anyway.

Here you are, dear reader, in worship on a Sabbath day. Maybe you have come from a long habit, as you have week after week, almost giving up hope for healing. Maybe you feel that your life is just fine without Jesus' healing touch, but you popped in for some other reason. Maybe you haven't been able to articulate, even to yourself, what you need today, let alone say it aloud. Whatever the reason, Jesus extends his hand to you now and offers you healing. You don't even have to ask. The living Christ knows what you need and offers it to you without question, conversation or negotiation. May you receive the healing that Christ extends!
