"This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you. When you drink this cup ever after this night, remember me."

SHARING OF THE BREAD AND CUP

All who desire the Sacrament, including children, are invited to come forward at the direction of the deacons to one of two locations at the front of the sanctuary, where you will be served the bread and the cup. The cup contains grape juice (apple juice is provided in the center of each tray) and all bread is gluten-free. Please partake of the elements as they are given to you, then give the empty cup to the nearby steward before returning to your seat by the side aisle. You are welcome to kneel in prayer at the altar rail. If you want to receive the elements in the pew for any reason, please notify a deacon.

After all have received the bread and the cup:

Great is the mystery of faith. Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again.







HISTORIC CLOCK TOWER PRESERVATION CAMPAIGN




It is time to repair and restore the historic and iconic clock tower, complete with the belfry, lantern, and spire of Trinity Chapel. Dry rot and decay, both natural byproducts of age, along with water damage and weathering over the years, require restoration. The estimate for repair is \$1,000,000.

Why make such an investment? The most important reason is the message it gives. We display a large banner declaring that God is still speaking. The tower declares a companion message: God is still here – and God is not going anywhere – and neither are we. Our belfry, clock tower, lantern, and spire still remind people of God's presence and reassure all passersby that God is still here.

Together we can meet this challenge. You received letters and a commitment card in the mail. The cards are slowly returning, and people are being generous. We need more responses, however. Please return your card using the self-addressed, stamped envelope, or bring it to church with you and place it in a designated collection basket.

We launched our community campaign earlier this month. The Community Foundation stands ready to collect donations. Check out our website: <u>saveourspires.org</u>. You will see a wonderful video telling about the project. Show it to your friends and encourage them to donate. Get the word out in every way you can. SEVENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

July 7, 2024

Mark 6:1-13

"Sent with Power"

Mark 6:7-9 tells us that (Jesus) called the twelve and began to send them out two by two, and gave them authority over the unclean spirits. He ordered them to take nothing for their journey except a staff; no bread, no bag, no money in their belts; but to wear sandals and not to put on two tunics. (from the NRSV)

Some folks in the United Church of Christ jokingly refer to evangelism as "the e-word." Evangelist simply means "messenger of good news." And yet, the word has become associated with the most damaging aspects of Christian experience. Even the the idea of evangelism can call to mind uncomfortable or even traumatizing past experiences. And yet, as Jesus called those early disciples to a life of evangelism, he calls followers today.

Take some time today to consider the word evangelist.

Do you think the idea of United Church of Christ evangelism can be refreshed and renewed for a new generation? How might that be accomplished?

How do you feel when you hear the word evangelism? Pay attention to where the word settles in your body. Do you feel quite comfortable? Very uncomfortable? Why do you think you have that response?

What do you think the role of an evangelist is? How does the role in modern times echo the call that Jesus made to his original disciples?

What are some ways that your faith community engages in evangelism now? What are some ways that your community could evangelize that it does not yet?
