We encourage you to join us for in the Community Room for Fellowship after the worship service for casual conversation and connection over light refreshments.

We also ask that you refrain from applause after our choirs sing and allow the music to resonate in the quiet of the sanctuary and in your hearts. Our musicians are playing and singing for the glory of God. They know you appreciate their efforts and their gift.

Restrooms, accessible and equipped with changing stations, are located on the 2nd floor, below the sanctuary, and on the 1st floor, outside the Community Room. Single-occupant, all-gender, accessible restrooms are located outside the North and Flora Rooms on the 2nd floor.

James 3:13 - 4:3, 7-8 | Mark 9:30-37

The epistle from James may be understood as a meditation on the contrast between godly and worldly leadership. The attributes of a godly leader are laid out in James 3:13: evidence of works born out of good conduct that are done in the gentleness of wisdom. In the passage from Mark 9, Jesus tells the disciples that he is to be betrayed, killed, and resurrected on the third day. The disciples turn to arguing with each other about who is the greatest among them. Jesus teaches his ambitious followers about the shape of faithful discipleship by taking a little child in his arms and blessing the child. God's wise children are called to welcome and care for the "little ones" among us. Wise ones reach out with encouraging presence to those who are vulnerable.

Our Season of Stewardship continues as we hear from Justin Coen. The Senior Choir will sing.



COMMUNION ON THE CREEK

The heart of our calling as disciples of Christ is to be busy *good-newsing*. That's right – it's a real verb, but one you may be better familiar with as *evangelizing*. The great commission we are called to is not conversion; it's simply this: to spread the good news we learned about through Christ – the good news of God's universal love, our inherent human dignity, and the boundlessness of God's grace – into the world.

Sounds like good news indeed. Except we know what has become of this beautiful word. Evangelism has come to be associated with coercion and manipulation, fearmongering, othering and divisiveness, power-grabbing, and imperialism. In short, anything BUT good news. Yikes!

The time is long overdue to take this beautiful word back from the forces that have abused and distorted it for their own ends. But how? Well, there is no need to reinvent the wheel when Christ himself blessed us with the perfect way to tell and demonstrate the authentic good news: Communion. At the Lord's Table, everyone is welcome, and at that table, we rejoice together as we celebrate that all are already loved by our Creator, just as we are.

On each of the first four Tuesdays in October (1, 8, 15, and 22), Rev. Michelle Beadle will celebrate Communion on the hour from 10:00 AM – 1:00 PM in the Trellis area of Carroll Creek Linear Park (NE corner where Market Street intersects park). These celebrations will last 15 minutes and will lift-up one of the following themes:

- Celebrating the Open Table
- Remembering What "Remembering" Means
- The Mystery of the Cross
- The Anatomy of Communion

All four themes will be lifted up once each Tuesday. Each week, the lesson rotation will stagger so that if anyone comes at the same time on different weeks, they will be able to enjoy a new celebration.


Mental Health Justice for All: Mental Health is a Universal Human Right Sunday, October 6

The Neighbors in Need offering, which we will receive on October 6, supports the UCC's ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States.

Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Love of Church Unit to fund a wide array of local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects. Through the national Love of Church Unit, https://tinyurl.com/2bfytatb, you can find resources, news updates, and action alerts on a broad spectrum of justice issues. Working with members of the UCC Justice and Peace Action Network (a network of thousands of UCC justice and peace advocates), the Love of Church Unit continues its strong policy advocacy work on issues such as the federal budget, voting rights, immigration, health care, hate crimes, civil liberties, and environmental justice.

Neighbors in Need also supports our American Indian neighbors in the UCC. One-third of the offering supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM). Historically, forebears of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandan, Hidatsa, Arickara, and Hocak in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, and northern Nebraska. Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal UCC congregation in Minneapolis, Minnesota. These churches and their pastors are supported by CAIM. CAIM is also an invaluable resource for more than 1,000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of other UCC congregations in the U.S.

CHILDREN'S SUNDAY SCHOOL

Children's **Sunday School** takes place in ERUCC's main building. Children should be checked in by one of their grown-ups at the Check-In Station in the Kieffer Lobby before class.

Mark 8:27-38

Who Are You, Jesus?

"Who do people say I am?"

Jesus is certainly brave in asking this question. Think about it. Would you really want to hear how someone perceives you? We all have an image we think we are putting out to the universe that is often perceived differently by others.

But Jesus, who is preparing his followers for his impending death — wants to see if the ragtag bunch is understanding the cost that comes with picking up the cross.

Of course, Peter, the one who leaps before looking, jumps right in with the bold proclamation, "You are the Messiah."

Good job, Peter. Even though you still don't quite understand what you just said. That will come — in time.

Your turn now. Who do you say Jesus is?

Before you give the Sunday school answer you were taught years ago, stop. Really give it some thought. Who would you say Jesus is for you right now? Your answer might just reveal where you are on your faith journey.

A pastor once asked a group of second graders the "Who is Jesus?" question. Their answers were of course adorable.

Jesus is my teddy bear. Jesus is my cookie monster. Jesus is my best pal. Jesus is my boo-boo healer.

A few years later, the pastor asked those children, now teens preparing for confirmation, the same question. Who is Jesus?

This time, the answers were not so adorable. Rather, they were raw and revealing.

Jesus is my safe place. Jesus is my sponsor. Jesus is my secret keeper. Jesus is the parent I wished I had.

The reality is that there will be many different Jesus' who walk alongside us, being the unwavering love and hope needed as we change, grow and move on to new stages in life — either willingly or unwillingly. And that is the beauty of our Lord's question. It reminds us that through it all, he is always exactly what we need.

Yes, Jesus is our Messiah. He is our Lord and Savior. He is also our Safe Place, our Secret Keeper, our Heartbreak Healer ...

Once again, it's your turn. Spend some time in prayer, pondering Jesus' question that he asks of you: "Who do you say I am?"

Jesus, You are my ______, and I thank You for Your unwavering love and care in each stage of my life. Amen.
