Thank you for worshiping with us at Evangelical Reformed United Church of Christ (ERUCC) this morning. We extend a special welcome to our guests.

For Children: We have trained nursery staff for ages 0-4. A deacon or greeter can guide you to the nursery. Children ages five and above are invited to stay and worship with their families. Children's items, books, and crayons are in the rear of the sanctuary, and a table is available for quiet activities at the front of the sanctuary.

We ask that you **please silence your cell phones** during our worship service. We also ask that you refrain from applause after our choirs sing and allow the music to resonate in the quiet of the sanctuary and in your hearts. Our musicians are playing and singing for the glory of God. They know you appreciate their efforts and their gift.

Restrooms, accessible and equipped with changing stations, are located on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor, below the sanctuary, and on the 1<sup>st</sup> floor, outside the Community Room. Single-occupant, all-gender, accessible restrooms are located outside the North and Flora Rooms on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor.





#### INVITATION TO THE TABLE

People will come from east and west and north and south to sit at table in the Kingdom of God. They will come with hope and they will come with doubts.

They will come with faith and they will come with fears. They will come with love and they will come with regrets. They will come from all over. They will come across all sorts of barriers and boundaries. They will come. They will all come for God longs for it to be so.

Joining God's people across the globe and joining the saints of every time and place, we come to this table today. Everyone is welcome. God longs for it to be so. God longs to feed with us – all of us – with the bread of life and the cup of salvation.

#### **COMMUNION PRAYER**

Blessed are you, O God our Creator, whose image dwells in every face of the human family. Joined with the global chorus of our siblings in Christ around the world, we glorify you and pray for the day when the earth will be filled with the knowledge of you as waters upon the face of the sea. When the world could wait no longer, you sent your Son into the world to show us your many faces: Unexpected child, Unwelcomed refugee, Unhoused wayfarer, Teacher, Healer, Lover of the unlovable, Toucher of the untouchable, Forgiver of the

unforgiveable, Loved by the least, feared by authority, friend of the weak, foe of the strong. As once you set your face to Jerusalem to relieve your people's suffering once and for all—send now your Holy Spirit to the people of Palestine, starving and tired of being starved... the people of Burundi, impoverished and tired of being impoverished... the people of Ukraine, warravaged and tired of being war-ravaged... the people of El Salvador, corrupted and tired of being corrupted... the people of the United States, divided and tired of being divided. By your Spirit unite all peoples in Christ until we feast with him and all the saints in light. Through Christ, with Christ, in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor are yours, Almighty God, now and forever. Amen.

#### WORDS OF INSTITUTION

On the night he was betrayed, the Light of the World took bread and blessed it. Then he thanked God for it and broke it, saying: "This is my body which is broken for you. Whenever you eat it, remember me."

And likewise at the end of the meal, Jesus took the cup, blessed it and thanked God for it. Pouring out the red wine, he said:

"This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you.

When you drink this cup ever after this night, remember me."

Now, let us come to receive the bread and the cup.

#### SHARING OF THE BREAD AND CUP

All who desire the Sacrament, including children, are invited to come forward at the direction of the deacons to the chancel rail, where you will be served the bread and the cup. You may kneel or stand to receive the elements. The cup contains grape juice (apple juice is provided in the center of each tray) and all bread is gluten-free. Please partake of the elements as they are given to you, then give the empty cup to the nearby steward before returning to your seat by the side aisle. If you want to receive the elements in the pew for any reason, please notify a deacon.

After all have received the bread and the cup:

Great is the mystery of faith. Christ has died:

Christ has died,
Christ is risen;
Christ will come again.

Next Sunday: October 12 – Eighteenth Sunday after Pentecost

Jeremiah 29:1, 4-7 | Luke 17:11-19

Our readings invite us into the twin practices of faithful presence and radical gratitude. Jeremiah counsels exiles to bloom where they're planted, to seek the flourishing of even unwelcoming places. Jesus' encounter with ten lepers becomes a story about recognition and response: one foreigner sees clearly what nine miss entirely. How do we live as people of hope in difficult circumstances? What would it look like to live with the kind of gratitude that changes everything?

We welcome our German friends from Inden-Langerwehe this morning. We will be receiving new members into the life of the church. Spirit will share in music leadership this morning.

## SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

October 5, 2025 Psalm 137

#### Free to Grieve

A seminary professor once told his class of future pastors that there should always be a box of tissues in the pews of the churches they will serve.

"If a person can't cry in the sanctuary, then where?" he asked.

I took this advice to heart. Every church I shepherded I made the case to the frugal finance committee for why we needed to order boxes of tissues for the pews.

It was an added cost worth every penny because there was always one person who came through the church doors as a stranger seeking solace who stayed as a sibling who had found healing. And the comment from these solace seekers was always the same: "Pastor, I was grateful for those tissues. I never felt like I could cry like that in church." To which I replied, "If not here, then where?"

For the exiled Israelites it was by the rivers of Babylon where we are told they hung their harps on the willows and proceeded to lament — sobbing a great and heavy collective sob over all that they had lost. They were captives of Babylon. They had lost not just their physical homes, but their spiritual havens as well. They were stripped of their identities and their freedoms.

There are many today in our world in need of a willow to hang their harp on. They need a safe place to crumble to the ground and sob over all that they have lost, be it an actual place of belonging or a sense of purpose.

Perhaps we, ourselves, are finding the Israelites' grief hitting too close to home. Losses are piling on top of losses without anytime to properly grieve or adjust to realities that are strange and unwelcomed.

We are living in a time where we all need to give ourselves — and others — the permission to freely grieve. We need to open wide those floodgates that have been holding back our tears. We need to cry to God in our distress. We need to wail and flail over all the injustices happening to and around us. We are in a place of exile from what we have treasured, and thought would never be taken away from us.

We all need a riverbank where we can sit and grieve. We need a place of refuge where we can let it all out. We need a pew with a box of tissues in it, lovingly placed by a pastor who is ready to shed a tear with us.

Compassionate God who not only hears our cries, but weeps with us, we bring you our tears, asking you to wipe them away and restore to us a sense of renewal and wholeness. In Jesus' name, we pray. Amen.
