Thank you for worshiping with us at Evangelical Reformed United Church of Christ (ERUCC) this morning. We extend a special welcome to our guests.

If you are a guest, please visit us at the Welcome Table in the rear of the sanctuary. We would love to meet and learn more about you and are available to answer your questions ERUCC. Please also feel free to reach out to someone sitting near you and ask them questions about the service or church. We encourage you to join us for in the Community Room for Fellowship after the worship service for casual conversation and connection over light refreshments.

ERUCC is an Open and Affirming Church of the United Church of Christ. We welcome into the full life and ministry persons of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions.

For Children: We have trained nursery staff for ages 0-4. A deacon or greeter can guide you to the nursery. Children ages 5 and above are invited to stay and worship with their families. Children's programs, books, and crayons are in the rear of the sanctuary near the welcome table and a children's table is available for quiet activities at the front of the sanctuary.

We ask that you **please silence your cell phones** during our worship service. We also ask that you refrain from applause after our choirs sing and allow the music to resonate in the quiet of the sanctuary and in your hearts. Our musicians are playing and singing for the glory of God. They know you appreciate their efforts and their gift.

Restrooms, accessible and equipped with changing stations, are located on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor, below the sanctuary, and on the 1<sup>st</sup> floor, outside the Community Room. Single-occupant, all-gender, accessible restrooms are located outside the North and Flora Rooms on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor.



Psalm 139 | Luke 19:1-10

Today's readings celebrate the God who sees us completely and loves us still. The psalmist marvels at being known from conception to grave: searched, understood, and pursued by divine love. Zacchaeus discovers this same reality when Jesus looks up into his tree and invites himself to dinner, transforming a despised tax collector into a generous neighbor. What happens when we truly believe we are seen, known, and chosen? Both passages suggest that being fully known by God is not something to fear, but the very foundation of transformation.

We will share in Holy Communion at the chancel rail on this All Saints Sunday as we remember in prayer members of the congregation and friends and family who have died in the past year. The Senior Choir will sing.

#### LET'S TALK: CHRISTIAN NATIONALISM—WHAT'S THAT?

Led by Rev. Dr. Rebecca Shillingburg and Dr. Matt Davis. Have you heard the term 'Christian Nationalism' and wondered exactly what it means, how Christians should approach it, and why Christians in other traditions adhere to aspects of it? In this class, we will be reading Brian Kaylor's book The Bible According to Christian Nationalists: Exploiting Scripture for Political Power and using that as a launching point to discuss the history, intellectual foundations, composition, and objectives of the movement. We will examine and critically analyze Scripture passages that have been oft-cited as proof texts by Christian Nationalist thought leaders, as well as additional amplifying passages that present counterpoints. Our goal is to equip you to understand this important movement that is reshaping the country in which we live, as well as the age-old question of what our position as Christians should be towards political power.

Luke 18:9-14

## **Just Worship**

I had a childhood friend who always wanted attention. Be it on the playground or in the classroom, her favorite words were, "Look at me!" She needed affirmation. She desired recognition.

I, on the hand, was quite shy. So, whenever my friend went into spotlight seeking mode, I would inch away from her. I didn't want attention by association.

While I never would stop being her friend, at times it bothered me. So much so that I would take my frustration to the one person I knew would listen and understand. No, not God. Although that should have been my first choice. Rather, I took my woes to my mom.

The wisdom she spoke to me, I can still hear today. Those who cry "look at me" are often lacking something deep inside, she said. When you know who you are — more importantly, when you know it is God you belong to — then there is no need to be loud in your search for validation.

Luke's Gospel illustrates this perfectly for us, presenting a picture of two people praying in the public square. One, a Pharisee, bellowing his "look at me" prayer for all to hear.

"Thank you, God, that I am not like the tax collector," he shouts in misguided praise and thanksgiving.

The other person is in fact that tax collector, who also comes before God in a time of much-need prayer. But rather than stepping into the spotlight, he hides himself in the shadows. He doesn't want anyone looking at him. He doesn't even want God's eyes on him. He is sorrowful and truly repentant.

God, though, sees the man in the shadows. God also sees the attention-seeking Pharisee. And God sees right into their hearts. So, when Jesus tells his friends which man went home justified, they might have been surprised to have heard it was the man in the shadows.

"Look at me! Look at me!" is not something that should be coming out of the mouths of those following Christ. For Jesus, himself, reminded his friends often that he had come to serve and not be served. Jesus taught there was greatness in weakness and that the first shall be last and the last shall be first.

We don't have to shout to God this day, "Look at me!" Rather, we should be whispering, "Have mercy on me." For God already sees us. God knows the desires, fears, joys, and secrets that are in our hearts. We don't need to validate our goodness or our worth with God. And for that, let the people shout, "Amen!"

All-knowing God, you who sees into our hearts know already what we need. We do not need to justify our goodness or seek validation. We are your beloved children, and you care for us deeply. Help us this day to remember how worthy we are in your sight. In Jesus' name, we pray. Amen.
