Thank you for worshiping with us at Evangelical Reformed United Church of Christ (ERUCC) this morning. We extend a special welcome to our guests.

If you are a guest, please visit us at the Welcome Table in the lobby. We would love to meet and learn more about you, and we are available to answer your questions. Please also feel free to reach out to someone sitting near you and ask them questions about the service or church. We encourage you to join us in the Community Room for Fellowship after the worship service for casual conversation and connection over light refreshments.

ERUCC is an Open and Affirming Church of the United Church of Christ. We welcome into the full life and ministry people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions.

For Children: We have trained nursery staff for ages 0-4. A deacon or greeter can guide you to the nursery. Children aged 5 and above are invited to stay and worship with their families. Children's programs, books, and crayons are in the rear of the sanctuary near the welcome table and a children's table is available for quiet activities at the front of the sanctuary.

We ask that you **please silence your cell phones** during our worship service. We also ask that you refrain from applause after our choirs sing and allow the music to resonate in the quiet of the sanctuary and in your hearts. Our musicians are playing and singing for the glory of God. They know you appreciate their efforts and their gift.

Restrooms, accessible and equipped with changing stations, are located on the 2nd floor, below the sanctuary, and on the 1st floor, outside the Community Room. Single-occupant, all-gender, accessible restrooms are located outside the North and Flora Rooms on the 2nd floor.



Next Sunday: November 23 – Reign of Christ Sunday

Colossians 1:11-20 | Luke 23:33-43

Today's readings reveal the upside-down nature of Christ's kingdom. Paul's soaring hymn celebrates Jesus as the cosmic ruler in whom all things hold together, while Luke shows us this same Christ dying between two criminals, extending grace to a thief in his final moments. What kind of king reigns from a cross? What kind of power looks like weakness? Both passages invite us to see that true authority comes not through domination but through self-giving love that transforms even death into victory.

Led by Rev. Dr. Rebecca Shillingburg and Dr. Matt Davis. Have you heard the term 'Christian Nationalism' and wondered exactly what it means, how Christians should approach it, and why Christians in other traditions adhere to aspects of it? In this class, we will be reading Brian Kaylor's book The Bible According to Christian Nationalists: Exploiting Scripture for Political Power and using that as a launching point to discuss the history, intellectual foundations, composition, and objectives of the movement. We will examine and critically analyze Scripture passages that have been oft-cited as proof texts by Christian Nationalist thought leaders, as well as additional amplifying passages that present counterpoints. Our goal is to equip you to understand this important movement that is reshaping the country in which we live, as well as the age-old question of what our position as Christians should be towards political power.

SUPPORT HURRICANE MELISSA RELIEF EFFORTS

Hurricane Melissa made landfall in Jamaica on October 28 as a Category 5 storm with sustained wind speeds more than 175 mph. Most of the island remains without power, telecommunications and other basic utilities. Over 13,000 people in Jamaica remain in shelters and 34 fatalities have been reported – a number that is expected to rise as search and rescue efforts continue.

After making its way across Jamaica, Hurricane Melissa made a second landfall on Cuba's southeastern shore as a Category 3 storm and inflicted significant flooding and wind damage across the southeastern part of the country.

In Haiti, heavy sustained winds from Hurricane Melissa's rain bands and significant storm surge led to severe flooding and landslides. Authorities in Haiti report 25 fatalities, with that number also expected to rise in the coming days.

The United Church of Christ is issuing an appeal to support the immediate and long-term needs of affected communities across the region. The primary needs at this stage of recovery are shelter, safe drinking water, sanitation, healthcare, and food. In the coming days and weeks, the focus will shift to debris removal and restoration of access. Long-term support for reconstruction of homes, recovery of livelihoods, and restoration of community services will be essential in the days, months, and years ahead.

Through ACT Alliance's Rapid Response Fund and our long-standing partnership with Church World Service, the UCC is already working to get resources for those who need them across the region. Through Global Ministries, we are also in contact with our partners in Jamaica, Cuba and Haiti and are working quickly to accompany and support their response efforts.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

One of the Finance Committee's roles is to track our Mission Spending Plan to make sure we are being good stewards of our income and expenses. Understanding that income and expenses vary every month, fall is a good time for a good check-in on our 2025 finances. This time of the year takes into account most of the months and yet is far enough away from December and the end of the fiscal year to make any needed financial course corrections.

As of September 30, the congregation donated \$414,579 of the \$481,740 Tithes and Offering funds that were budgeted to be received as of that date, which is \$67,161 under budget, or 86% of what we budgeted to be received. In addition, the congregation donated \$27,552 of Support income representing 129% of budget, giving us a total of \$441,131 of direct contributions, 88% of what we anticipated.

On the expense side, through September 30 we spent \$779,169 versus a mission spending plan calling for spending \$740,152 through this date, representing an attainment of 105% of what we budgeted to spend.

As the calendar rolls over into November, now is a good time to reflect on your financial support of ERUCC for 2025 and catch up on this amount or consider kicking in a bump as we start our Advent preparations and Christmas celebration. Church Parking Lot Reminders



To ensure safety, accessibility, and good neighborliness, please review the following important guidelines for using the church parking lot:

1. Park only in clearly marked parking spaces.

Do not park along curbs, in unmarked areas, or in any way that blocks driveways, alleys, or pathways. These right-of-way areas must remain open at all times for emergency vehicles, our neighbors, and those accessing the Community Fridge.

2. Never block another vehicle in.

This includes double-parking or parking behind someone who is already parked. All vehicles must be able to enter and exit freely at all times.

3. Always display your ERUCC Authorized Parking permit.

Place your permit on your dashboard whenever you park in the lot. If you need a permit, please contact the church office or visit the reception desk on Sunday.

4. Building users must display time-limited parking placards.

Groups using space in the building are often assigned a limited number of parking spaces, and they must display the special event parking placard provided to them. These placards ensure we can identify authorized vehicles and maintain proper capacity.

5. If you are physically able, please avoid parking in the lot.

Street parking is free after 5:00 PM Monday–Saturday and all day Sunday, and nearby City of Frederick garages are excellent alternatives. Garage parking is free on Sundays from 8:00 AM – 2:00 PM.

6. Please call the office before using the lot for any personal parking.

Anytime you want to park for personal reasons—during the week, evenings, or weekends outside worship—contact the church office to confirm availability. This helps us manage limited spots and avoid conflicts with building users & ministries.

7. Please reserve Sunday morning parking for those with reduced mobility.

If you can walk from street parking or a garage, your choice helps ensure members and guests with mobility challenges can park close to the building.

8. Thursday evening parking is reserved for choir members.

Your cooperation ensures dependable access for those participating in the church's music ministry.

9. Please anticipate new signage and active parking enforcement soon.

To ensure the lot is used safely and appropriately, ERUCC will be installing updated signage and implementing enforcement of parking expectations.

Isaiah 65:17-25

Infinite Possibilities

Imagine a world where everyone gets along. A place where the Lord says nothing shall be hurt or destroyed, where even the wolf and the lamb eat together peacefully.

This is the vision of a peaceable kingdom that the prophet Isaiah brings to us today. It is a world where only happiness and rejoicing exists. There is no pain nor sorrow.

My friends, such a world is possible because our God is one who holds infinite possibilities. It is only our own limited capacities for love and redemption that keep us captive to finite probabilities.

What if this day, though, we could lay aside our disbelief and enter the God possibilities? What if we could finally believe the world can change for the better, starting with our own hearts realizing that nothing is ever hopeless.

Take for instance the miraculous story of the wolf of Gubbio, which is found in the 14th-century short story collection, *The Little Flowers of St. Francis*. The story tells of saint's encounter with the good people of Gubbio, Italy, who are being terrorized by a heartless and vicious wolf. The wolf not only steals their food but also their children.

Francis finds the wolf, but before the animal can attack, the saint makes the sign of the cross over its head. The wolf bows down and leans into Francis, who then asks the wolf why the residents of Gubbio are angry with him. The wolf says he is simply hungry.

Francis then makes a deal with the townsfolk to feed the wolf, who he has now named "Brother Wolf."

In return, Brother Wolf promises not to do any harm. For years, wolf and people live in peace, with Brother Wolf roaming the village streets and entering homes without incident. When Brother Wolf dies, Gubbio grieves deeply. The feared enemy had become a dear friend, and all it took was for someone to listen to the one who was misunderstood. All it took was for someone to take note of the struggle beneath the façade of strength to make peace in Gubbio possible.

While just a legend, the story is a moving tale that not only tugs at our heartstrings but invokes a vision of God's hope for us all — to live in harmony with one another.

What if we stopped fearing the wolves in our lives and seek to understand the "enemy" we tend to mistrust and hate all too quickly? Perhaps if we did, we would come to tame not only the wolf roaming about, but the wolf within.

Limitless God, your love knows no boundaries. It is far-reaching and healing. Help us to see beyond the limitations that our fears and disbelief nurture. Fill our minds with wisdom from above and help us to take a step towards a more peaceable world. In Jesus' name, we pray. Amen.
