

Let Us Welcome the Season of Advent and All That it Implies

Friends, like many of you, I am really looking forward to the upcoming Season of Advent. It provides us with extraordinary "hope" at a time when we've been inundated with one negative, hurtful, and harmful, un-American experience after another. Many of you have heard me say, "We serve a God that is infinitely more loving, caring, compassionate, and steadfast than those narcissistic, self-centered, power-grabbing crooks who think they are currently in control of our U.S. government. Now, however, we are entering a season of hope, and my personal sense is that the overwhelmingly positive election results we've just witnessed may be a foretaste of the good to come.

"Advent" means "coming" or "arrival." During the season of Advent, we celebrate Christ's coming into the world and watch with expectant hope for him to come again. In its historical origins, the season of Advent was patterned after the season of Lent, a six-week period of penitence and preparation for Easter. Similarly, the four weeks of Advent present an opportunity for communal discernment and personal examination, as the church prepares to celebrate the Nativity of the Lord and looks with hope for Christ's return.

Between memory and hope (Is not this where we currently find ourselves?)

An excerpt from the Companion to the Book of Common Worship (Geneva Press, 2003, 96):

In Advent, we expectantly wait for the One who has already come. We anticipate the promised justice of God's new world, yet we praise God

who raised the "righteous branch" to rule with justice and righteousness. We hope for the restoration of the afflicted, the tormented, and the grieving, yet we delight that healing has come in Christ. We long for the beating of swords into plowshares, yet we rejoice that the Prince of Peace has appeared. We yearn for the barren deserts of our inner cities to flourish, yet we laud the desert Rose that has bloomed. We dream of the land where lions and lambs live in harmony, yet we acclaim the child born to lead us into the promised land.

Christ has come! Christ is risen! Christ will come again! In Advent, we are living between the first and the second coming of the Lord. The dialectical tension of maranatha [alternately translated "Come, our Lord!" or "Our Lord has come"] — placing us between memory and hope, past and future — that will strengthen our Advent liturgies. Perhaps we need to cling to the ancient cry of maranatha! And its paradoxical meanings, so we may freely embrace "the new thing" prophesied by Isaiah (Isaiah 43:19) that God is doing among us right now. The tension and paradox we find in Advent shape our celebrations during this most sacred season. Come, let us journey together.

Advent 2025 – 2 –

Advent 2025: What do you fear?

WHAT MAKES YOU AFRAID? This year during Advent, we will read Luke's Gospel through the eyes of those oppressed by the Roman Empire. Luke's Gospel begins the story of Jesus with this opening line: "In the days of King Herod..." This detail may seem minor to us; however, it reveals layers of information about the fearful world Jesus entered, one filled with rampant oppression, economic disparity, uncertainty, and instability. A world not so unlike our own. And yet, throughout the stories of Christ's birth, the whispers of angels deliver a surprising message: "Do not fear."

In our own time, we might ask: is it even possible to be fearless in a fearful world? When Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, and the magi are each called into God's redemptive story, they do not deny their fears—they move through them. They ask questions, hold fast to courage, and say, "Here I am, Lord." When we find ourselves in fearful times, can we acknowledge our fears while also insisting on hope?



Advent Worship Notes

November 30 - First Sunday of Advent

In the Time of Herod, We Long for God to Break In Lamentations 3:55-57 | Luke 1:5-13



"In the days of King Herod..." With these words, Luke's Gospel grounds the birth of Jesus in a world shaped by violence, occupation, and fear. The author of Lamentations cries out in personal pain while his homeland is under Babylonian rule. Our global and personal heartache are intertwined, and the wait for promised rescue is hard to bear. Whether in exile, under the rule of a puppet king, or in the depths of personal pain, we long for God to break through the fear and bring us hope.

December 7 - Second Sunday of Advent

When We're Running Out of Hope, God is At Work Isaiah 43:19-21 | Matthew 11:1-11




John the Baptist sends word to Jesus from his prison cell, asking, "Are you the one?" John has spent his entire life preparing the way for Jesus; yet now, from his prison cell, the future looks grim. Like John, even the most confident of us wonders from time to time: Is all this work worth it? Does anything I do matter? Am I on the right track? We can't always see the fruits of our labor, yet God is at work anyway. How might we, like Jesus and Isaiah, point to the places where God is at work in our world? How might we keep hope alive?

We will share in Communion at the chancel rail. The Senior Choir will share a cantata.

CANTATA – Light of Peace: Celtic Carols for Christmas Sunday, December 7, 10:30 AM Service of Worship

In Light of Peace: Celtic Carols for Christmas, Karen Marrolli has created a cantata featuring five anthems, each using traditional tunes from the British Isles refreshed with new settings and new lyrics. Weaving together these familiar Irish and Scottish tunes with popular Celtic folk tunes, reels, and airs, this cantata offers fresh interpretations linking the Nativity story to themes of social justice, refocusing the traditional holiday story on discipleship and service. Together, old and new tunes and stories suggest our proper response to Christmas is living a life of love through action.



Advent 2025 – 4 –

December 14 - Third Sunday of Advent

Even in Our Fear, We are Called Forward Jeremiah 1:4-10 | Luke 1:26-39



Sometimes saying "yes" to God's call fills us with fear. Like Mary and Jeremiah, we fear that we aren't enough, we'll be alone, and no one will listen. And yet, God calls us forward, inviting us to live fully into who we are created to be and promising to be with us every step of the way as we move forward through our fear. Too often, we talk about bravery and courage in terms of hero narratives or big actions, but each day presents many moments to practice small, quiet acts of courage. May we say "yes" to God, even when our knees shake and our voices tremble.

Spirit will be sharing in music leadership.

December 18 – Longest Night Service 7:30 PM

Although Advent is a joyful season for so many, we also know that for some this time of year can be drenched in fatigue, grief, and loneliness. We will gather as a community to honor that reality and draw near to God to allow space for healing and prayer.

Bring your grief. Bring your weariness. Bring your fatigue. We hope this time of worship can be a gift to individuals and communities alike, providing a calm, quiet, and healing space. May you find peace in your journey.

The Senior Choir will be singing.

December 21 - Fourth Sunday of Advent

When You're Afraid, Give Me Your Hand Matthew 1:18-25



"Give me your hand" might be counter to how we usually respond to fear, but what if fear can result in connection instead of isolation? Joseph moves through his fears of rejection and shame to stand in solidarity with Mary, shielding her from harm. Their bond makes them stronger. We don't live out our callings in isolation—our communal flourishing depends on each person stepping into their calling despite their fear. How can we offer support to one another? To whom can we reach out when fear makes us feel isolated? When do we need to accept an outstretched hand? And can we use our power and privilege, like Joseph, to stand in solidarity with people whose lives are at risk?

Today, we celebrate our annual Lessons and Carols service with our college students reading the scriptures. The Senior Choir will be singing.

December 24 - Christmas Eve

Good News is Louder than Fear Luke 2:1-20



The Christmas season can be filled with saccharine images of Mary, meek and mild, with a quiet, sleepy Jesus in her arms, but the host of angels shouts to the skies, "Glory to God in the highest!" What would it look like for us to proclaim the good news loudly, with overflowing joy? In a world that weaponizes fear, where algorithms decide what gets weight, what gets circulated, and what takes up space, let us be disruptive with our joy. Let us be loud and unruly, amplifying the good news like the shepherds running into the streets of Bethlehem. In a world where good news never feels loud enough to drown out fear, let us shout with the angels, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace!"

December 28 - First Sunday after Christmas

Let Fear Fuel a Fire for Justice Matthew 2:13-15, 19-23



The Holy Family fears for their safety and for their child's life, like so many refugees around the world. Their valid fears motivate them to move—and so they seek refuge in Egypt until it is safe for them to return home. Instead of trying to push fear away, what if we used it as fuel? What if we harnessed that incredible source of energy for good, fighting for a world where no one fears for their safety? Utilizing our fear wisely not only helps others; taking concrete action also interrupts the fear that so easily paralyzes us. The work helps others, but the act of putting our fear to work changes us, too.

The service will include our "Letting Go and Letting God" ritual, when the congregation will be invited to write down on a piece of dissolvable paper those things that each person wants to let go of from the ending year, receive God's grace, and move into the new year with divine blessing and hope. The dissolving pieces of paper will be placed in a water bowl at the front of the chancel.

January 4 - Epiphany

Fear Doesn't Stop Us Matthew 2:1-12, 16-18



Christ is born, yet it feels as if the world has not changed. The temptation to give up is strong, especially in the face of violence. But the magi don't let Herod's fear-driven demands stop them from honoring the newborn Christ or returning home by a different way. They model for us what it looks like to be led by hope, moving through fear without letting it paralyze us. As the new year begins, we proclaim: our journey continues, and fear won't have the last word.

We will share communion at the chancel rail this morning and receive our star words for the year. The Senior Choir will sing.

All-Church, Intergenerational Christmas Pageant!

Sometimes a terrific new practice emerges when our primary plan is blocked by events outside our control and we have to devise a back-up plan. In Advent 2024, our very first Intergenerational Christmas Pageant got "iced" out on the planned evening, so we quickly pivoted to the back-up plan: staging the pageant Sunday morning between the 8:30 and 10:30 AM worship services. It was great! More people were able to attend, the energy from both participants and the audience was higher, and there was stronger participation across generations.

So, we're going to do it again this year— on Sunday, December 21, at 9:30 AM. Here's how to participate:

- Children, please arrive at 9:15 AM, in the children's Sunday School area where you will choose a costume.
- Some youth will be invited in advance to take a reading part. Other youth will assist the younger children in moving from the Sunday School area to the sanctuary and with their exits and entrances "on stage" at the appropriate times.
- Anyone of any age can be a sheep, an angel, or a wise person following a star from the East. Costumes for these critical roles will be at the back of the sanctuary.

You won't want to miss this fun opportunity to "play" together as we remember and reenact the story of that first Christmas. Please join us!

December 1st

word of the day Longing

BREATH PRAYER

INHALE: God listens

EXHALE: to my deepest longings.

Pick up a list of words with corresponding breath prayers for each day of Advent from the back of the sanctuary.

For your day, make a video approximately one minute long that shares the word, shares your connection to the word for Advent in a few sentences, and demonstrates the breath prayer.

Here's a model for such a recording: "Hello, I'm Pastor Kirstin, and the word for today, December 1, is "longing." To me, longing connects with the season of Advent as we anticipate the gathering darkness and strive to hold onto hope in our hearts. For today's breath prayer, we will breathe in saying 'God listens' and breathe out saying, 'To my deepest longings.' (Repeat the prayer 3x) Amen! Have a great day!"

Upload your homemade video that day, or send it to Pastor Kirstin in a text, and she will upload it for you.

Walking and Praying the Labyrinth

Walking a labyrinth is an experience of praying with our entire body. The journey to the center is symbolic of a pilgrimage to connect anew with God. A person on the journey can remain in the center as long as they desire. Then, taking the same path, they return to the outside of the labyrinth, renewed and refreshed by their communion with God.

Labyrinths were designed in the early Middle Ages as an alternative prayer experience for Christians unable to make a pilgrimage to the Holy City of Jerusalem. They continue to be used by many people today. Sometimes people enter the labyrinth with a special problem or intention. Sometimes this helps mark a change in their own life path, such as a graduation, the birth of a child, or a change of job or vocation. At other times walking the labyrinth is a practice used to reconnect meaningfully with God the Creator.

Advent Midweek: Walking and Praying

Walking a labyrinth is an ancient spiritual discipline. This year, beginning on Wednesday, December 3, we invite you to gather at 12:00 PM at various locations in our area to walk a labyrinth.

Locations will be announced as they are confirmed. One of our church members will "host" us at each location, offering an explanation of the labyrinth for anyone unfamiliar with this spiritual discipline and a suggested prayer focus related to that week's worship theme. If this time is not convenient for you, you can walk at a time and location of your own choosing. Pastor Kirstin will also share each week's prayer focus on our internal Facebook group, so we can all focus our prayer or devotion time on our "What Do You Fear?" Advent theme.

For our last Wednesday in Advent, December 24, we will walk indoors, in our own Community Room. A host will again be present at 12:00 PM; we will be walking on a the canvas labyrinth borrowed from Trinty UMC. That day, the labyrinth will also remain available until 9:00 PM for church members to take some sacred time to connect with God through this unique body prayer experience. In addition to walking and praying, on Christmas Eve we invite you to bring a food item or toiletry supply so we can see how much of the path we can line with donations for the Community Fridge.

To access ERUCC's labyrinth, simply walk down the alleyway on either side of Trinity Chapel to reach the stone patio behind the building.




Advent 2025 – 16 –
