Our musicians are playing and singing for the glory of God. They know you appreciate their efforts and their gift.

Restrooms, accessible and equipped with changing stations, are located on the 2nd floor, below the sanctuary, and on the 1st floor, outside the Community Room. Single-occupant, all-gender, accessible restrooms are located outside the North and Flora Rooms on the 2nd floor.

Next Sunday: January 25 – Third Sunday after the Epiphany

Isaiah 9:1–4 | Matthew 4:1–17

Epiphany continues to reveal how God's light breaks into places shaped by fear, struggle, and uncertainty. In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus' message takes shape among ordinary people, in real places marked by hardship and hope. Matthew presents Jesus as one who brings light where shadows linger, echoing Isaiah's promise that those who walk in darkness will see a great light. This good news is both comforting and challenging, calling us to turn toward God's ways and to trust that transformation is already unfolding among us.

The Rev. John Shillingburg will be preaching and leading worship. Ann Thompson will be our guest organist. The Senior Choir will sing.

***The Lilac People* by Milo Todd.** Based on the true experiences of the LGBTQ+ population of Berlin/Germany before Hitler, during the war, and after liberation.

In 1932 Berlin, a trans man named Bertie and his friends spend carefree nights at the Eldorado Club, the epicenter of Berlin's thriving queer community. An employee of the renowned Dr. Magnus Hirschfeld at the Institute of Sexual Science, Bertie works to improve queer rights in Germany and beyond. But everything changes when Hitler rises to power. The Institute is raided, the Eldorado is shuttered, and queer people are rounded up. Bertie barely escapes with his girlfriend, Sofie, to a nearby farm. There they take on the identities of an elderly couple and live for more than a decade in isolation.

LET'S TALK: PRACTICING PEACE IN TIMES OF WAR

Led by Susan Kulp. Many of us are struggling to find our way in the face of previously unimaginable, radical changes occurring daily in our world. Join us as we explore together effective ways to respond to these assaults. The class is based on the short book, *Practicing Peace in Times of War*, by Pema Chödrön, an American Buddhist nun in the Tibetan tradition who draws on Buddhist teachings to explore the origins of aggression, hatred, and war.

The way we respond to challenges in our everyday lives can either perpetuate a culture of violence or create a new culture of compassion. She offers practical ways to break the cycles of violence and aggression. We will also explore the parallels between these teachings and those of Jesus and the Bible as a whole. Our neighbors at The Temple and M&T Bank, have asked us, along with other nearby congregations, to share an important note regarding parking. The lot at the corner of W. Church and N. Court Streets is not available for ERUCC use. This request applies to all days and times, including Sunday mornings. Towing will be enforced starting late January. We are grateful for our relationships with our neighbors and ask for your cooperation as we honor their request and help maintain a spirit of mutual respect and good neighborliness in our downtown community.

Please also review the following important guidelines for using the church parking lot:

1. **Park only in clearly marked parking spaces.** Do not park along curbs, in unmarked areas, or in any way that blocks driveways, alleys, or pathways.
2. **Never block another vehicle in.** This includes double-parking or parking behind someone who is already parked. All vehicles must be able to always enter and exit freely.
3. **Always display your ERUCC Authorized Parking permit.** Place your permit on your dashboard whenever you park in the lot. If you need a permit, please contact the church office or visit the reception desk on Sunday.
4. **Building users must display time-limited parking placards.** Groups using space in the building are often assigned a limited number of parking spaces, and they must display the special event parking placard provided to them.
5. **If you are physically able, please avoid parking in the lot.** Street parking is free after 5:00 PM Monday–Saturday and all day Sunday, and nearby City of Frederick garages are excellent alternatives. Garage parking is free on Sundays from 8:00 AM – 2:00 PM.
6. **Please call the office before using the lot for any personal parking.** Anytime you want to park for personal reasons—during the week, evenings, or weekends outside worship—contact the church office to confirm availability.
7. **Please reserve Sunday morning parking for those with reduced mobility.** If you can walk from street parking or a garage, your choice helps ensure members and guests with mobility challenges can park close to the building.
8. **Thursday evening parking is reserved for choir members.** Your cooperation ensures dependable access for those participating in the church’s music ministry.

John 1:29-42

All That We Are

When the Spirit descended from heaven like a dove and remained on Jesus at his moment of baptism, John saw it. He was in the Jordan River baptizing his cousin, Jesus. He witnessed that holy, amazing moment. He knew Jesus was the one to follow — not him — and so, he told his two followers just that.

“Look, there’s the Lamb of God. That’s who you want to follow,” said John. So off they went after Jesus. Jesus, sensing he was being followed, turned and asked them bluntly, “What are you looking for?” To which they replied, “Where are you staying?”

What kind of question was that? So much meaning gets lost in translation as our modern ears hear this as a question of actual location or a curiosity about how one is living. But the former followers of John who wanted to be in the Jesus club, were not wanting to know if Jesus was in a hip neighborhood or residing in a swanky dwelling. Their question we discover is much deeper for the Greek word we translate into “staying” should read “abide.”

The word “abide” is an important one in John’s Gospel. It is used 10 times in the first 10 verses in John 15. The biblical definition for abide means “to be held or kept” or “to remain.” So, what the soon-to-be followers of Jesus wanted to know was who was holding this prophetic teacher. Who was “keeping” Jesus — keeping him safe, secure, steadfast?

Jesus’ reply “come and see” is also one that goes deeper than an invitation to tour his home and have a cup of tea. Jesus’ “come and see” is an invitation to an adventure that unfolds throughout the entire Gospel of John.

Come and see how I abide in God. Come and see the importance of abiding in me as I abide in you. Come and see how, with God, you will always be held tightly.

Let’s now revisit this story. Jesus walks by and we realize he is the one we need to follow. Just as we catch up with his flowing robes, he turns to us and asks, “What are you looking for?”

Pause here and really think about your answer. What have you been looking for? What have been our expectations of Jesus? What is it we hope to discover? Now dare to ask the question, “Where are you abiding?”

Show us, Lord, once and for all, how we can also remain in the safe and transformative care of God, so that we can face the trials of this life victoriously — and with grace.

Tell us, Lord, where you abide because we would like to abide there as well. Let us end our time together praying the words of the great old hymn, “Abide with Me.”

Abide with me, fast falls the eventide. The darkness deepens, Lord with me abide. When other helpers fail and comforts flee, help of the helpless, oh, abide with me. May it be so. In Jesus’ name, we pray. Amen.
